The people of North Carolina, especially the editors of the State hear with sorrow of the death of that excellent man and popular editor, Mr. J. A. Thomas, of the FRANKLIN TIMES, Louisburg, N. C. His death was not unexpected though it cast a gloom over the hearts of all who knew him. None knew him but to admire him. He was one of the most popular men in his county and by his county had often been honored. As an editor he was held in high esteem by that fraternity and was a strong man in North Carolina Press Association. With his bereaved ones we share the loss that falls heavily at this time.—News Reporter.

EDITOR J. A. THOMAS.

The following tribute was taken from the editorial column of the News and Observer of August 26th.

In the passing away of Editor J. A. Thomas, of Louisburg, the State has lost one of its most loyal and patriotic sons, a distinct loss to his church, his country, his profession and to his community, besides that other keen heart breaking loss which comes to those of his own family circle.

Editor Thomas, for it is as the editor of the FRANKLIN TIMES that he became a power of uplift to his town, his county and his section, was a man who did not spare himself, his time or his means when it came to the question of helping others. He was a big hearted man, loyal and true to every interest, broad-minded and level headed, a staunch friend and a valued adviser. He had that personal quality that tied men to him as with hooks of steel and the death call to him has found an echo in the grief of many who esteemed and loved him, and who in the familiarity of friendship from man to man, affectionately called him "Dolly."

There was a hard struggle made to save his life, but his disease went beyond the help of medical skill and he was called hence. In his town and county there is deep grief among all classes, for he had won a place in the hearts of his people, a christian gentleman ever ready to lend a helping hand and to give support to a good cause. His people had honored him, for three times he had been a town commissioner, four times the mayor of Louisburg, and for three terms the treasurer of Franklin county, filling every position with credit and honor to himself and to the people.

As a party leader of the Democracy Mr. Thomas stood as one of its best and truest members. In times of conflict he was a champion of its measures and of its principles. For fifteen years the chairman of the County Democratic Executive Committee, for years a member of the Congressional and State executive committees and a delegate to the National Democratic Convention, his influence was strong. At the last State Convention he was continued as a member of the Central Executive Committee, his services proving always of value to the Democratic party. As a newspaper-man he had made the FRANKLIN TIMES a power in his county and section, one of the ablest of the exponents of Democracy and one of the best of county papers, having been its owner and editor for thirty years. His co-laborers of the State press, recognizing his worth, elected him as President of the State Press Association, a position which he held in 1908-1909. His death is a loss to the editorial forces of the State.

As a man among men he had won a place, and as a true man, a true son of North Carolina he will be mourned. He gave freely as God had given him to give, and the best tribute that can be paid to him is to say that it is as a man, a true man, that he is mourned. Many hearts have been saddened by the news of

his death, many tears have been shed, and the flowers that are spread in all their loveliness above the new-made mound in the cemetery at Louisburg will whisper the message of love from many, "Good night, true and tried friend; good bye, loyal son of North Carolina."

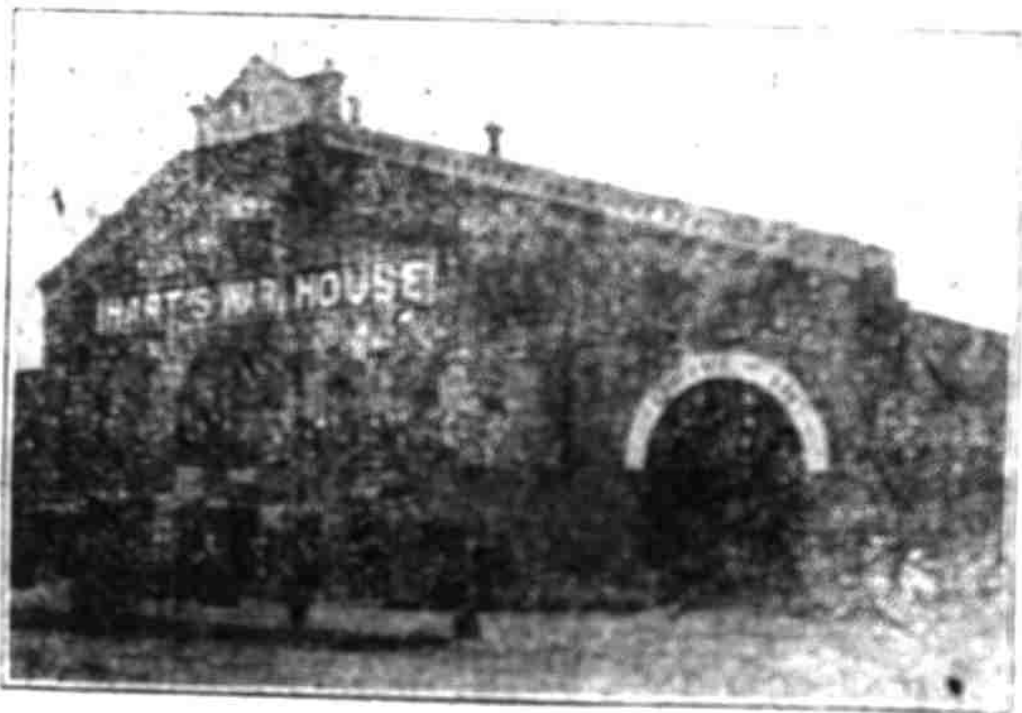
