The object of the contest is to arouse the farmers, to stimulate greater interest in industrial education, to eliminate prejudice, to encourage or to show the farmers the advantage of cultivating a small crop thoroughly over that of a large one partially and to instill in the minds of every rural negro farmer a friendly agricultural spirit of rivalry.

Each contestant will be required to grow one acre each of wheat, and corn and must give one-half bushel of wheat, and two bushels of corn on the ear as a sample and also for the purpose of defraying expenses, such as circulars, premiums, etc. A premium of \$25.00 will be given to the farmer who grows the greatest number of bushels of wheat and corn per acre. The same amount will be given to the lady who presents the best can of preserves. Now is the time to enter the contest do not delay, because you need to begin to improve the acre for wheat and corn.

There has been organized at Louisburg a Farmers Union and we hope that the colored farmers of Franklin county will avail themselves of the opportunity to become members.

Our corn cribs, smoke houses, hay stacks and vegetable gardens are too far removed, the contest is the remedy for such so do not hesitate to connect yourself with it.
