The Good Roads.
Your reporter had the pleasure of a trip over the good roads in Franklinton township in company with Messrs A. H. Vann, B. T. Green, C. S. Williams and Mr. W. S. Spoon on Tuesday in the automobile of Mr. Vann. Mr. Spoon, is employed by the United States Government, and is furnished the State by such to assist in the building of good roads and is located at Chapel Hill. He was here on an invitation from the Board of Road Trustees to examine their work and soil and to see if they were building the best roads for the money they were expending. Mr. Spoon's expressions were all praise to the Trustees for their good work and said that this piece of road, when completed, provided the same good work was carried out that had been started, would not be excelled by any in the State and claimed further that the road was being built on very economical plans, not having to haul their gravel so far and in some places not having to gravel at all.
Surely there is no one who will oppose good roads or even criticize the idea after taking a ride over such roads as these, and the Trustees

are to be congratulated upon their excellent work. Their principle is not to follow the old road only where it is practical but to build new ones and to build them substantial so that they will last for an indefinite period.
