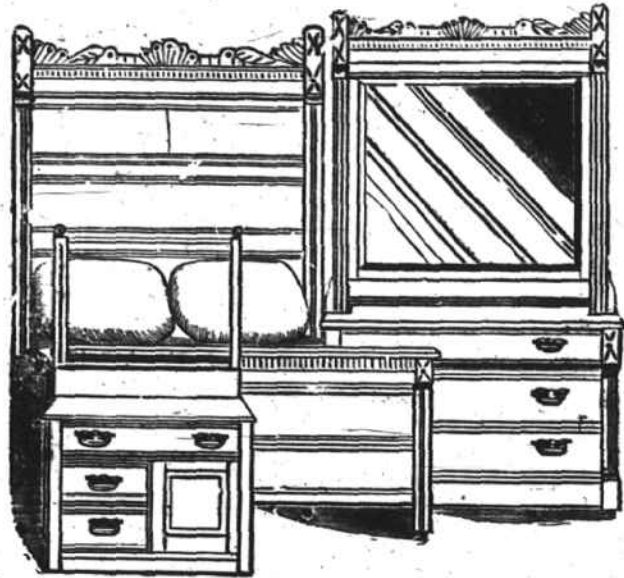

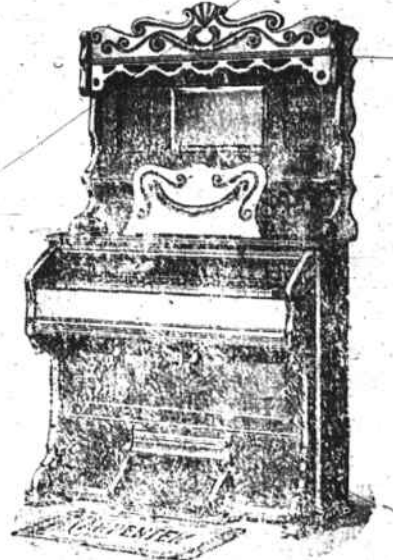

Baseball.

Oxford on last Thursday defeated the home team here in a one-sided game by the score of 9 to 4. It was apparent from the start that it was Oxford's winning day. One very sensational play was made by Barnes, for Franklinton, a catch on second, which deserves special mention. Cates for the home team did very well, but did not receive the support he should have had. Underwood pitched winning ball in the last four innings, not allowing the visitors to score on him. Tucker pitched a very good game for the visitors allowing eleven hits, but they were so well scattered he succeeded in holding his own. Franklinton had the bases full several times but failed to score. Batteries for Oxford, Tucker and Canady; for Franklinton, Cates, Perkins, Underwood and Stuart, Umpire, Dr. A. R. Winston. Time of game, two and one fourth hours. Attendance 150.

Franklinton in an errorless and very exciting game of ball won from Louisburg here last Friday afternoon. It was a pitchers battle from the start. Credit is also due Underwood, who played first base for Franklinton, Prim and Winston B. The home team took the lead in the third, making two runs. Louisburg tied the score in the fourth, after which it looked as if it would take more than nine innings to decide the game. However, Prim was walked, made second on Hedgepeth's balk and scored on Winston B., hit to right winning the game. This game was one of the best exhibitions of the national game ever exhibited here. Every store in town was closed and a record breaking crowd was out. The summary was as follows:
