THE BIGGEST DEMOCRATIC LANDSLIDE SINCE 1882

STATE GIVES MAJORITY ABOUT 50,000
The Entire County Ticket Elected by Good Majority
SOLID DEMOCRATIC DELEGATION TO CONGRESS
The People of North Carolina Showed Their Contempt For Marion Butler at the Polls--Pou Gets Majority of Nearly 7,000 Over Cooley--New York, New Jersey, Massachusetts, Nebraska, Ohio, Connecticut and Other States Elect Governors



The reports from the election at a distance indicate the largest democratic gains since 1882—a veritable democratic landslide. New York, Massachusetts, New Jersey, Nebraska, Connecticut all elect democratic governors and possibly Ohio. In New York the entire democratic ticket was elected.

The next House will be democratic by a good strong majority and the democrats gain seven Senators. The reports say that in Chicago the democrats made the largest landslide in years, and even Pennsylvania was reported as doubtful. If such a spirit continues for the next two years there will be no trouble in electing a democratic president.

Judging from their actions the people of the entire country are acknowledging that the democratic party is the party for the people and now the feeling continues.

STATE

The best estimates obtainable before going to press show that the entire State democratic ticket was elected by a majority of about 50,000, which is a decided gain for the State. All ten of the Congressmen from this state were elected, with the possible exception of the eighth district, but indications point this district to a democratic majority.

In Wake county where the biggest fight was expected, owing to the trouble inside the party, the straight democratic ticket was elected by a majority of from 900 to 2000 and the State and Congressional tickets by above 2000.

COUNTY

The election in Franklin county Tuesday passed off very quietly, but the result was positive. The Democratic ticket was elected by majorities ranging from 1411 to 1633—every township in the county with exception of Hayesville giving a good strong majority for the ticket. Although the total vote polled was somewhat smaller than two years ago the per cent of increased majority over the republicans was decisive. In another column will be found a tabulated vote of Franklin county by precincts.

The result Tuesday shows that the people all over the county as well as in North Carolina and Franklin county are in earnest about good government and that they depend upon the democratic party to give it to them. It was truly a big democratic victory and everybody is rejoicing in the outcome.

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS MET IN REGULAR SESSION LAST MONDAY.

Petition for Special School Tax In Cedar Rock and White Level School Districts Received—Reports Filed.
 The Board of County Commissioners met in regular session on Monday all members being present. After reading minutes of last regular meeting the following business was transacted:
 W. A. Mitchell was relieved of taxes on 10 acres of land valued at \$7 per acre in Franklinton township.
 D. T. Fuller was reimbursed of taxes on seventy acres of land valued at \$6 per acre for 1910 and county part for 1909—same being given in and paid twice.
 John Perry was relieved of Franklinton Graded School tax, \$142, the same to be paid out of the said graded school fund—not being in said district.
 W. E. Dement was relieved of taxes on ninety acres of land in Sandy Creek township—the same having been paid by Jackson.
 S. T. Robbins was relieved of poll tax in Harris township on account of his having lost a leg.
 It was ordered that F. S. Spruill be notified to come and settle the taxes of the Greenleaf-Johnson Lumber Company and others at once, or notify the commissioners that he cannot attend to same.
 Report of F. R. Pleasants, Manager Medical Depository, was received and filed.
 Report of E. N. Williams, Superintendent of county home, was received and filed. He reports 10 white and 14 colored inmates—one white received since last report.
 Report of Dr. J. E. Malone, Superintendent of Health, was received and filed. He reports county home and jail in good condition.
 Fannie Rodwell and children were placed on outside pauper list at \$3.00 per month for five months only.
 A petition for an election for a special school tax in Cedar Rock school district No. 3 and White Level school district No. 5, both of Cedar Rock township was received and allowed.
 Mrs. Elizabeth Proctor was stricken from outside pauper list—being dead.
 Lizzie Upchurch was placed on outside pauper list at \$1.00 per month.
 A number of accounts were allowed and the Board adjourned to next regular meeting.
