Thanksgiving Day—Orphans' Day.

The work of the orphanages of North Carolina appeals most strongly to reason and to sympathy. These institutions are worthy of the heartiest support of our people and they have a large place in their interest and gifts and efforts.

At the Thanksgiving season minds and hearts turn especially toward our orphanages and many are the practical expressions of gratitude made to this cause by a people richly blessed.

These love-prompted gifts to carry on this blessed work with these little ones surely must be acceptable to God, the Father of the fatherless.

It seems that, here in North Carolina, Thanksgiving Day has been specially set apart as "Orphans' Day" and we rejoice that this is true. The contributions made at this season help very much indeed in the support of our various orphanages.

We trust that even larger offering will be made at this Thanksgiving season than ever before to the end that these institutions may be the better able to perform their service. They need funds for maintenance, for improvement and for the extension of the work.

Progressive Farming.

The object of the Farmer's Co-operative Demonstration work is to teach the best methods of agriculture. The methods advocated by this branch of the government's work are not theories, but are such practices as are used by the most successful farmers throughout the country. It would be a great thing for the country if every farmer were as good a farmer as the best ones.

To carry on the work a good local farmer establishes from forty to one hundred Demonstration Farms in a county. On these farms the best methods of agriculture are put into practice. Not only the man who conducts the Demonstration is benefited but his neighbors may learn from him. With a number of such farms as centers of study, there is no reason why every farmer in a county should not be benefited.

The county supervisor is given a short course of preparation, so that he may be able to understand thoroughly the fundamental principles of successful agriculture and so that he is qualified to help other farmers in any way they may need aid. In other words the movement is a kind of school of agriculture which is available to any one who may care to get into it. The work has been in operation for six years. There are sixty thousand farmers enrolled, in the South, of which number about five thousand are in North Carolina. The yield of corn on three thousand acres in North Carolina last season was 40.8 bushels per acre. The average yield for the state was 16.5 bushels.

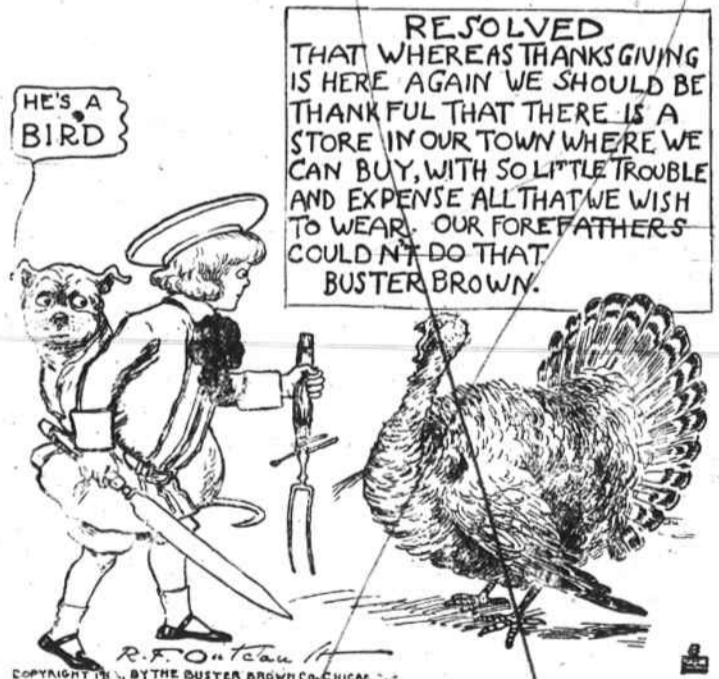
