Lieut. R. M. Brown Resigns.

Sergeant Brown then served his Company as right guide till 1904 when he received the appointment of First Sergeant which position he held until he was elected Second Lieutenant in 1905 which he has faithfully held until now. He has made a good officer and is held in very high esteem by all who know him. Officers and men of the guard would do well to take his service in the guard as a model and strive to do as he did. Take high ideals and study the work to reach them. He will be greatly missed and will be remembered by his comrades. An election will probably be held soon to fill the vacancy.
