DOING THINGS.

Nash County Health Officer Shows What One Man Can Do in Health Work

Vaccinating over 2,000 people in one county against typhoid in about three months is a fine record. That is just what Dr. B. E. Washburn, whole time county health officer in Nash county, reports. During the month of August he immunized 1,531 people. The people of Nash county as well as their health officer seem to realize more than ever the real value of a health officer in saving lives and preventing sickness. The results of only a few months of this kind of work are beginning to show in the decrease in the typhoid fever season, there were 17. On August 31, at the height of the typhoid fever season, there were only sixteen cases in the entire community. This is said to be much less than usual.

Besides the special work against typhoid, the Nash County Health Officer during the last month vaccinated seventy-eight people against smallpox examined and treated twelve for hookworm disease, examined four specimens of sputum for tuberculosis, gave eleven lectures on health subjects, besides doing the usual work formerly done by the county physician, namely, visiting the jail and county home and making commitment examinations for the State Hospital.

The story of the progress of health work is best told in the closing paragraph of the August report of the Health Officer, where he says: "Citizens in all parts of Nash County are becoming interested in public health work, as is shown by the large attendance at the dispensaries. The health officer is constantly called upon to give advice on problems relating to the betterment of sanitary conditions about the homes and places of work, and the demand for literature on health topics is also increasing. These things show that Nash County has developed to the point where the citizens realize the value of health and are ready to co-operate in any endeavor to prevent sickness."

COLORED BETTER BABIES

Big Health Contest at State Fair—First of its Kind.

A colored Better Babies Contest! Think of it! Hundreds of little colored babies of all sizes, kinds and descriptions at the Colored State Fair the last week of October. Hardly had the first day of the white Better Babies Contest passed last year before several of the enterprising colored people began to ask how they might have a colored Better Babies Contest, but the time was too short for such a thing then, and it had to be put off until this year.

The colored people mean to have a sure enough Contest this year. They have already arranged with the State Board of Health to leave all the paraphernalia and equipment from the white Better Babies Contest over for the use of the colored babies. They have arranged with the Women's Home Companion to award gold and bronze medals and diplomas to all prize-winning babies, and certificates of award to all babies entering.

As in the case of the white Better Babies Contest, there will be none of the old time fancy dress, pretty lace or beauty show about the Contest. The hundreds of colored babies will be weighed, measured and examined, point by point, by colored doctors and trained nurses, to see how they correspond with standard weights and measures of babies for that age. These weights and measurements and all other points will be carefully recorded on score cards, and each baby will receive a score, mark or grade.

Where any physical defect of any kind is found, it will be pointed out to the parent and the means of remedying it explained. Only babies between the ages of six and forty eight months may be entered. No charge whatever will be made for entering. All that is necessary is address Maggie L. Capehart, 310 East Davis Street, Raleigh, stating the name and age of the baby and the date at which it is expected to attend the Fair. Upon receipt of this information, an application card will be issued, which will admit the baby to the Contest.

It was decided to have the sales start each day at 10 o'clock and sell on all days through the week except Saturday and Sunday. The publication of a lot of sales cards was ordered and have been distributed.
