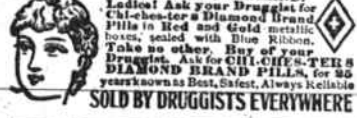

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SYNOPSIS OF THE PRIMARY LAW.

Public Laws of 1915, Chapter 101 As
Applicable to the Primary Election
To Be Held in 1916.

Section 1. State primary to be held
on Saturday, June 3, 1916, for state
officers, members of congress, district
officers, and members of the general
assembly.

Sec. 2. State primary to be held on
Saturday, June 3, 1916, for president
and vice-president:

may by party primary express choice
for president and vice-president:
delegates to national convention to
be bound by votes in primary:

state board of elections to make all
necessary rules and regulations for
carrying out the provisions of the act.

Sec. 3. Primary to be conducted in
accordance with general election law
and chapter 90 of the Revisal, and all
other statutes shall apply to primary
elections unless otherwise provided
for in this act:

all acts made criminal in the elec-
tion laws shall be criminal when
committed in a primary.

Sec. 4. State board of elections will
meet on Saturday, March 25, 1916, to
appoint the county boards of elec-
tions:

the county boards of elections will
meet on Saturday, April 15, 1916, at
the court house and organize in the
manner provided by law:

the county boards of elections, on
Saturday, April 22, 1916, shall ap-
point a registrar and judges of elec-
tions for each election precinct in the
manner prescribed by law:

the registrars and judges so ap-
pointed shall likewise serve in the
general election following their ap-
pointment unless for good cause the
county board of elections shall ap-
point others:

the registrars and judges before en-
tering upon their duties shall take the
oath of office.

The following-named sums shall be
paid to the state board of elections by
the candidates for the following offices
at the time of filing notices of candi-
dacy:

For congressional office \$59.00
For judge of superior court, solicitor,
or any state officer \$20.00
For state senator \$5.00

Candidates for any county office, at
the time of filing notice of candidacy,
shall pay to the county board of elec-
tions \$5.00, except candidates for sur-
veyor, coroner, and county commis-
sioners, who shall pay \$1.00:

constables and township officers are
not required to pay any fee.

Sec. 5. The registration books shall
be open from Thursday, April 27, 1916,
and closed on Saturday, May 29, 1916.

At the first primary new registra-
tion books shall be provided in which
on each page, there shall be a column
headed with language, "With which
political party are you affiliated?":

the registrar shall transcribe the
names of all formerly registered vot-
ers in his precinct onto such a book
for such compensation as the state
board shall indicate, to be paid by the
county:

When such voter whose name has
been thus transcribed appears for the
first time to vote in a primary, he shall
answer such question above stated,
and the registrar and judges shall
write opposite his name his answer.

All other persons not already regis-
tered, who shall register to vote in a
primary, shall have propounded to
them by the registrar, when such per-
sons register, the same question.

No person is entitled to vote in a
primary unless he be a legal voter or
shall become legally entitled to vote
at the next general election and has
duly declared his party affiliation.

Sec. 6. Notice of candidacy and
pledge to abide the result by a candi-
date for any office, other than for the
state senate in a district composed of
only one county, for the house of rep-
resentatives, or for a county office,
shall be filed with the state board of
elections on or before April 22, 1916:

such notice by a candidate for the
state senate in a district composed of
only one county, for the house of rep-
resentatives, or for a county office
shall be filed with the county board of
elections on or before May 20, 1916.

Sec. 6 1/2. Sworn itemized state-
ments of all moneys spent by him and
which he knows to have been spent
by any one for him shall be filed on or
before May 24, 1916, by candidates for
state or district office or for state sen-
ate in a district composed of more
than one county, with the secretary of
state, and by candidates for the state
senate in districts composed of only
one county, and for the house of rep-
resentatives with the clerk of the su-
perior court:

sworn itemized statements shall be
filed on or before June 23, 1916, with
the secretary of state or clerk of the
superior court as above provided, of
all money of other things of value
that he has spent and knows to have
been spent by any one else in his be-
half, and of all money that has been
contributed to him directly or indi-

rectly by any person or corporation,
and the names of the contributors;

and further, that he has neither di-
rectly or indirectly promised to give
anything of value to any person for
his support in such primary, and that
he has not promised to support any
person in return for such support.

Every candidate for a county office
shall file a like statement under oath
with the clerk of the superior court
of the county at the times hereinaf-
ter prescribed for notice to be filed
by the candidates for nomination for
state and other offices:

failure to file any statement pre-
scribed by this section shall constitute a
misdemeanor:

Provided, that with respect to the
selection of a candidate for the state
senate the provisions of chapter one
hundred and ninety-two, Public Laws
of one thousand nine hundred and
eleven, shall remain in force, except
that such candidate shall be selected
in a primary as authorized by this act
in the county entitled to name the
candidate for that election, and where
such candidate is named by one coun-
ty, the same provision as to notice and
statement of moneys spent shall apply
as if there were only one county in
the district.

Sec. 7. The expense of printing and
distributing poll books, blanks and
tickets for all state and district offices,
and per diem and expenses of the
state board of elections, to be paid by
the state:

the expense of printing and distrib-
uting tickets for all county offices, in-
cluding tickets for candidates for rep-
resentatives in the general assembly
and the per diem and expenses of the
county boards of elections, registrars
and judges of election, to be paid by
the counties.

Sec. 8. Chairman of state board of
elections to certify as to notices filed
with it to the secretary of state;

chairman of the state board of elec-
tions to certify to the county boards
of elections the facts as to such no-
tices as had been filed with it by can-
didates for nomination for the state
senate in districts composed of two or
more counties;

provisions instructing the state
board of elections as to the printing
of ballots and distribution to counties
the names to appear on ballots, the
expense of printing and distribution,
distinct ballots for each political party,
the names of parties and candi-
dates and offices to be indicated.

At least six days before the primary
election the chairman of the county
board shall distribute the official bal-
lots to the registrars and take a re-
ceipt therefor, and the registrars shall
have them at the several polling places
for the use of the electors at the time
of holding the primary.

Any elector or other officer who
shall accept appointment and who
shall, without previously resigning,
fail to perform in good faith the du-
ties prescribed by this act, shall be
guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon
conviction shall be fined or impris-
oned, in the discretion of the court.

Sec. 9. Only official ballots shall be
voted;

if other ballots be voted they shall
not be counted.

There shall be as many kinds of offi-
cial ballots as there are political par-
ties, members of which have filed no-
tice of their candidacy for primary
elections, and all ballots shall be
printed on white paper in black ink
and shall be of the same size and style
of printing; and the name of the po-
litical party whose ballot it shall be
printed in bold-face type at the top of
the ballot.

Sec. 10. Each elector shall be per-
mitted to vote for his choice for pres-
ident by name to be inserted in the
ballot arranged therefor, and to vote
for his choice of candidates for all
other offices under this act by making
a cross-mark in the small squares op-
posite the names of the respective
candidates for whom he elects to vote.

It shall be the duty of the board
of elections having in charge the duty
of printing the ballots for primary
elections to be held under the provisions
of this act to so print the ballots that
the names of the opposing candidates
for any office shall, as far as practi-
cable, alternate in position upon the
ballot, to the end that the name of
each candidate shall occupy, with re-
ference to the name of every other can-
didate for the same office, first position
second position, and every other po-
sition, if any, upon an equal number
of ballots, and distribute the said bal-
lots, when so printed, impartially and
without discrimination.

Sec. 11. The three ballot boxes for
each political party shall be provided,
labeled respectively:

"National Primary Box,"
"State Primary Box,"
"Legislative Primary Box";

in the first shall be deposited all
ballots for president, vice-president,
and members of congress;

in the second all ballots for state
and district offices other than sena-
torial districts;

in the third all ballots for members
of the general assembly and county
