An elector offering to vote shall de clare his political affiliation and shall then be furnished by the registrar ballots, as desired by him, of the pos litical party with which he affiliates. which he may vote, and he shall not in such primary be allowed to vote a ticket marked with the name of any poltical party of which he has not de-

clared himself to be a member; any one may at any time any elec

tor proposes to vote challenge his right to vote in the primary of any party upon the ground that he does not affiliate with such party, or does not in good faith intend to support the candidates nominated in the primary of such party; and it shall be the duty of the registrar and judges of election upon such challenge to determine whether or not the elector has a right to vote in said primary.

Provided, that he may vote for candidates for all or any of the offices printed on such ballot, as he shall elect, and he shall be required to disclose the name of the political party

printed thereon, and no more. Only names marked to be counted; may vote for only one confidate

or each office. Voter mry doposit his ball as in the

oper halls, boxes or perm t the registrar or a judge of election to deposit them.

Any person who has been a of the age of twenthous years between the time when the books closed for registration and the day of the primary election, and who is otherwise a qualified elector, and who desires to register and vote as a member of a political party, may do so in the manner

herein provided. Primary polling books to be provi-

ded; on such books shall be entered the name of the voter and opposite his name the party ticket voted:

books to be filed in the office of the clerk of the superior court;

polling booths to be provided by he county boards of elections and the judges and registrar in each precinct, where the voter may, if he de sires, prepare his ballot in secret;

the judges and registrar to give any voter any information he may desir as to what kind of ballot he is entitled to vote, and the names of the candidates and any information necessary to enable him to mark his ballot as he desires.

At the written acquest of the chair man of any political party of any coun ty, the judges and registrar of any precinct shall designate the name of some elector in each precinct, if there be such elector, who affiliates with such political party, who shall be fur nished the oppor unity to observe the method of holding such primary election; but such elector shall in no man ner interfere with the method of hold-

ing such election or interfere or communicate with or observe any voter in casting his ballot, but shall make such observation and notes of the manner of holding such election and the counting of the ballots as he may desire:

Provided, nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent any elector from casting at the general election a free and untrammeled ballot for the candidate or candidates of his choice.

Sec. 12. When the polls have been closed, the primary ballot boxes shall be opened in the presence of the registrar and judges of election and such electors as may desire to be present

The ballots of each of the several parties in the boxes in each precinct

SYNOPSIS OF THE PRIMARY LAW, tibute the same to the several precincts in the manner and at the time prescribed in the case of state offices Sec. 16. The provisions with respect to voting in the primary for state offices shall apply to the primary

election for county offices when not inconsistent with the provisions with reference to such primary elections. or county offices;the returns in such primary elec

tions for county officers shall be cerified to the appropriate county board elections, which shall declare and publish the results.

Sec. 17. That the several county boards of elections shall prepare, print and distribute the ballots for candidates for 'nomination as memher's of the general assembly, and on the same ballot of each party shall be printed the names of the candidate: for nominalton for the several county offices, and such ballots shall be distributed to the several registrars and judges of election at the same time that the ballots for state officers are required to be distributed under the provisions of this act:

and said county boards of elections shall take receipts therefor, and the everal registrars shall have such ballots at their respective polling places for the use of the electors at the time of holding the primary.

Sec. 18. That all ballots for nemination for county officers shall be deposited in the box labeled, "Legislative Primary Box

hereinbefore provided for, which box in addition to bearing the label, "Lagislative Primary Box," shall also im mediately thereunder be labeled. "County Primary Box."

Sec. 19. The sole candidate for the state senate in a district composed of only one county, for the house-of representatives, or for a county office. shall be declared the nominee of his party, and his name shall not, therefore, be placed on the primary ballot but shall be placed on the ballot to be voted at the general election. .

Sec. 20. That the several county boards of elections are hereby given authority to provide for holding in their respective counties primary elections for the choice of candidates for the nominations for township and precinct offices, and to prescribe and fix the rules and regulations under which the same shall be held; and the expenses thereof shall be paid by the sey eral counties.

Sec. 21. The registrar and judge of election at such precinct shall con tify upon blanks prepared and printed by the state board of elections the result of the primary election;

there shall be made two copies of returns; one copy shall be filed with the clerk of the court and one with the county board of elections;

it shall be the duty of the judges and registrars to preserve and keep for six months after each election the original ballots cast at such election. which ballots, after being counted, shall be placed in bundles, a separate and distinct bundle to be made of the ballots of each and every political party cast in each of the boxes; and each box in which ballots were cast shall be carefully sealed up before the election officers shall separate, so that nothing put in may be taken from them, and the signature of the registrar and judges of each precinct shall be inscribed at the same time on a seal placed on each box of the precinct, and no box shall be opened except upon written order of the county board of elections or a proper order

of court. The state board of elections shall prepare the printed form of returns to made by the judges and registrat
