**COAST ARTILLERY FOR INAUGURATION.**

**Plans Begin To Take Shape For Inaugurating Governor Bickett In Office.**

The coast artillery companies of the State will furnish the military feature of the inauguration of Governor T. W. Bickett. Provision will be made through the Adjutant General's office to have the coast artillerymen in Raleigh for the occasion, it became certain yesterday.

Col. George L. Peterson was in long distance communication with Mr. Bickett's law partner, R. Bruce White yesterday in regard to arrangements for the inauguration. Nothing definitely has been determined on the plans yet but every indication points to a gala occasion. The Raleigh Chamber of Commerce will co-operate in the event, according to Secretary A. T. Bowler, and it is expected that other organizations in the city will have a part.

The actual inaugural arrangements are in the hands of the committee appointed by the legislature. But Raleigh will see to it that accompanying celebrations will fitly mark the occasion.

In 1913 when Governor Craig was inaugurated, long before the legisla-

ture met and appointed its committee of preparation and arrangements, friends of the incoming Governor had prepared an accompanying program that filled the day of the inauguration. At present, the exact date of the ceremony is not certainly known. This matter, practically, is up to Mr. Bickett, who will be in Washington arguing the repudiated North Carolina bond case in the Supreme Court of the United States on Monday, January 8. The inaugural day is two days later. It is generally thought that the date for Mr. Bickett's entry upon his official duties will be moved up, on his request, until January 11. That will give him time to prepare.
