

THOSE WHO WERE DRAFTED

FROM FRANKLIN COUNTY TO COMPOSE THE FIRST CALL OF 687,000.

Not Entire List but Enough to Cover First Call—See if Your Name is in The Number.

Below we publish a list of those in Franklin county called for service in the first allotment. Every name registered was drawn out at Washington. The drawing serving only to re-rotate the names, which will be taken in the order drawn and renumbered by the local boards and then taken straight by the new numbers, as the several allotments are called for. In the first allotment Franklin county will have to furnish a gross total of 243. She has a credit of 97 men enlisted in the several branches of the army, which leaves a net quota of 146 men to be furnished. It is supposed that hardly more than one out of every three will be taken and therefore it is thought that the following list of 445 names will be sufficient to furnish the 146 men called for. The remainder of the list will be published in the proper order when the local Exemption Board makes up their official list:

With the above facts before our people let them be ready as soon as the rains cease to freely use lime around their home cellars and all damp places. Use freshly slacked lime and sprinkle it thick and thoroughly.

This will certainly be attracted to this foul earth so recently turned out from its long and apparently innocent sleep and visit homes, kitchens, dining rooms and tables with legs and wings laden with their unsavory burdens. Be ready to meet this crisis, and ward off and prevent sickness.

Demonstration.

We have been requested to make the following announcements: That when County Agent is out of town, cans may be obtained from W. H. Perdue, who has charge of Farmers Union Storage House. Those wishing tin cans are requested to get them at once as they will have to be moved by August 15th. Any one may buy them; sale is not

restricted to club members.

That canning demonstrations will be given in other communities than those scheduled last week if the people in any section desire them.

That Franklin county will have a series of Dairy Meetings or schools early in the fall. The meetings will be held at the school buildings. The program will consist of butter making demonstration; care of milk and cream; Babcock fat test; methods and uses of dairy products which can be utilized in the diet; judging dairy and beef breeds. These will be under the supervision of Prof. R. H. Mason, Assistant Dairy Husbandman, A. & E. College.

Deceased Was Highly Respected Citizen of Warren.

At the Geo. W. Alston burying ground in Warren county, near Inez, the remains of Mr. John Davis Alston, who died at the residence of his brother, Capt. Phil G. Alston, in this city late Thursday night were interred Friday afternoon, Rev. N. H. D. Wilson, pastor of the Louisburg Methodist church, officiating.

REGISTER BEFORE YOU LEAVE

UNDER THE ABSENTEE VOTERS ACT OF 1917.

That You May Vote, in All Elections Held While Away, by Mail. We are in receipt of the following letter from Chairman E. H. Malone, regarding the importance of registering right away under the absentee voters act of 1917. Read it carefully:

July 24, 1917. Mr. A. F. Johnson, Editor, Franklin Times, Louisburg, N. C. Dear Sir:-

Replying to your recent request relative to what is generally spoken of as the "Absentee Voters Act," I beg to advise that under the provisions of this act, any citizen of the State, by complying with the provisions of said act, who may be otherwise qualified to vote, may register and vote by mail in any election or primary hereafter held in the State.

All persons, not already registered, who may be otherwise qualified to register and vote in any election or primary in this State and who may expect to be absent from the County, during the usual period provided for registration, may present himself to the Chairman of the County Board of Elections, at any time other than the usual period provided for registration, and the said Chairman of the County Board of Elections will enter his name on a special book provided for that purpose by the Secretary of State. The Chairman of the County Board of Elections later certifies the names of persons, so registered before him, to the regularly appointed registrars of the various precincts and these names are entered on the regular registration books.

Upon application to the said Chairman of the County Board of Elections, said Chairman will mail to any voter absent from the county, as soon as received from the State Board of Elections, one each of the various ballots applied for to be voted in such elections or primaries, one blank certificate and one return envelope. The absent voter will fill out the certificate so furnished and return same, with his ballot in the return envelope, to the registrar of his precinct who will open these envelopes at 3 P. M. on the day of such election or primary. The vote of such absent voter will be subject to the usual challenges, but if found entitled to vote under the provisions of the act his ballot shall be deposited and counted just as if such voter were present in person.

It will appear from the act that it is unnecessary for any duly registered voter to register before the Chairman as above provided but in order to vote by mail, will have to apply to said Chairman for the necessary ballots, certificates and envelope to be mailed to him.

Mr. J. M. Allen, of Louisburg, N. C. is the present Chairman of the County Board of Elections and will be glad to render any assistance within his power to those desiring to register and I would suggest that it be the duty of every man in the County to see the men, who are members of the military companies, or who may be drafted into the service, and, wherever registration is necessary, to see that these men are presented to the said Chairman and registered.

If the writer can be of any assistance to any individual or can furnish any desired information in regard to this matter, he will be exceedingly glad to be called upon.
