LETTER FROM HEALTH OFFICER

Dear Mr. Editor:

Several things have interfered with and caused us to postpone a very important work, that is absolutely necessary for every town and village to attend to at least once a year if not oftener. The work and the hour has just about arrived—we must inspect the sanitary condition of the town. We have for the last several months and will at present our entire time and labors have been given to the examination of the soldier boys and the Public School children while the new quarantine law has called for extra work and attention but not withstanding the importance of all these duties the health of the town and county must not be neglected. I most earnestly and urgently call upon our city authority, the churches, schools and every citizen in Louisburg to come to the court house on the 15 of March and let us arrange a strong determined force to clean up and make sanitary the town. We especially call upon and feel certain that the many public spirited women of Louisburg can be relied on to take the lead and push this very important work. We see in the papers that the above date has been set aside all over the state for the necessary health work. While we have had no deaths in our town for years from infectious or contagious diseases, yet good luck may not always be ours along these lines, so please take notice, talk it and meet with us on the date mentioned and let us all pull together to keep up the reputation of our town and the good health of our people.
