Notice is hereby given that, in accordance with the provisions of An Act of the General Assembly of North Carolina, Session of 1919, entitled "An Act to Provide Good Roads in Harris Township, Franklin County," being House Bill No. 279, Senate Bill No. 341, ratified the 11th day of February, 1919, and upon the petition of the duly appointed and constituted Township Road Commission of Harris Township.
