HON. B. T. HOLDEN PRESIDES At Democratic County Convention Saturday.

ELECTS DELEGATES TO STATE CONVENTION.

A Most Harmonious Meeting—Both County, State and National Administrations Endorsed—Hon. Ben. T. Holden Endorsed For Delegate To National Convention and Also For Delegate At Large.

In pursuance of a call of the State Democratic Executive Committee the Democratic County Convention for Franklin County met in the Court House in Louisburg on Saturday at 12 o'clock. Chairman E. H. Malone, of the County Executive Committee called the convention to order, and after announcing the object of the meeting called Hon. Ben. T. Holden to the Chair and Mr. G. B. West as Secretary as temporary officers. These gentlemen came forward and took charge of the meeting. The first business being the election of permanent officers such action was announced by the chair. Upon motion of Williams, of Sandy Creek and seconded by several delegations the permanent organization was made permanent by a unanimous vote. Chairman Holden accepted the honor in a most beautiful and well delivered address, which rang true to the high principals of Democracy and was enjoyed by all who heard it.

Perry of Louisburg, made a motion that the voting strength of each township from Franklin in the State Convention be divided equally between the delegates and alternates attending. The motion being seconded by Dr. D. T. Smithwick also of Louisburg, was put and carried unanimously.

A motion was made by Hudson, of Louisburg, that the Convention endorse Hon. Ben. T. Holden as a delegate to the National Convention at San Francisco, to be elected at the State Convention in Raleigh from this Congressional District. The motion carried by an enthusiastic and unanimous vote. Mr. Holden offered his thanks for the honor in a very pretty impromptu speech.

Williams, of Sandy Creek, being recognized by the Chair, and in preparation for a motion he was to make later stated that there was quite a difference between now and twenty years ago. They met in this convention and bestowed the honor of the nomination upon those we thought best for the public offices. Today it is different. Just as radical changes has come about in all lines, times in all particulars have changed, but the grand old Democratic principles, which are always true to the people, have not. "Mr. Chairman," he continued, "I move that you appoint a committee to retire and draft resolutions endorsing the Democratic administration, County, State, and their part in the National Government."

The motion was discussed at length by many, the only question arising however was the way in which to get at the same end. All were agreed on the endorsement. FRIDAY'S STORM DID MUCH DAMAGE. Blew Up Trees, Took Roofs Off Houses, and Played Havoc Generally.

The heavy wind storms that visited Franklin County on Friday did considerable damage to standing timber, houses, etc. From all sections we learn of more or less damage especially tobacco barns. In the southern part of the county just near Mapleville it seemed to have been at its worst. On the farm of Mr. J. J. Lancaster it blew down around 20,000 feet of timber, twisted tops of two barns, blew a new pack house that was almost completed, almost entirely off its foundation, blew down a log pack-house, upset a large double stable building, blew down a two story log house occupied by Jordan Williams, tore down a rock chimney, and took the tops off of strip room and barn. At the home of Mr. T. W. Wheelless it did considerable damage to several barns and blew down a frame stable building. No injuries were sustained by persons or stock. The wind blew very hard in most all sections, but slight damage has been reported at other places.
