FRANKLIN COUNTY SCHOOL COLUMN

Items of Interest to Teachers, School Committees, Betterment Associations and People Interested in Public Schools of Franklin County.

1. The people in the Epsom School District voted last Monday in favor of a 30 cent local school tax. 137 registered, 88 voted in favor of the tax and 5 against. The people of this district are taking steps to make this school one of the strongest high schools in North Carolina. They realize that this cannot be done without cost and they showed their willingness and determination last Monday at the polls. There are three things necessary for any school district to be assured of a good school. Adequate building, Maintenance fund and Children. The Epsom school has two of these requirements. Maintenance fund and children. They have enrolled this year 226 pupils. The third requirement, an adequate building will come in the near future.

2. Dr. J. Henry Highsmith of the State Department of Education made a most interesting talk to the people of Bunn at the regular community meeting held in the school auditorium Friday night, March 18th.

3. On Friday night a Fiddlers' Convention was held at the Rileys School. The music included banjo, violin, guitar and mandolin. \$28 was raised which will be used for the school. Miss Eleanor Blackley, Miss Gladys Blackley and Miss Winnie Cox are the teachers in this school.

4. The play, "Sweet Family" and a Fiddlers' Convention was the program at Rock Springs last Friday night. A very appreciative audience was there and about \$30 were raised clear of expenses which will be used for the school.

5. The State Superintendent, Mr. E. C. Brooks has called a meeting of all the County Superintendents to be held in Greensboro, Wednesday, April 23rd.
