Making Old Bedroom Furniture Attractive.

Some of our club girls have been much interested in making their bedrooms attractive and have asked that directions for doing over old furniture be given.

In these directions I am assuming that the furniture to be treated is either an unsightly varnished bedroom set or is made up of odds and ends of painted pieces.

Decide on the color you would prefer for your room. Here are a few truchused colors that have proven very satisfactory: Ivory, gray and peacock blue.

Have at least two good paint brushes (one and one-half inch) and be sure to provide a pint or more of turpentine. After removing the varnish or paint from furniture wipe free from dust and apply twenty-four hours apart enough thin coats of paint to give the desired color.

Inserts cut from flowered cretonne are very effective when glued on painted furniture. A half wreath under the key-holes on the dresser drawers and the head and foot-board of the bed is good, or conventional designs on the drop-leaf of a table or on the backs of chairs are attractive.
