Over work and her anxiety to excel was largely the cause of the failure of her health. The Superintendents of schools at both Franklinton and Durham spoke in the highest terms of her work. At the time of her death she was a member of First Baptist church at Durham. The funeral services were conducted at the old home near Franklinton by her cousin Rev. John F. Mitchner. Ladies and gentlemen of the churches of Franklinton and Methodist churches of Durham sang some very appropriate selections at the house and at the grave, where we laid her body to rest beneath a mound of flowers. Her cousins acted as pall bearers. Quite a large gathering of relatives and friends from Raleigh and Franklinton, and the surrounding community were present to pay their last tribute of love and respect. The flowers were profuse and beautiful, and was an expression of the esteem in which she was held.
