Its a pity something can't be done to speed up the work on the streets. There is no telling how much business Louisburg is losing on account of them.

The voters of Franklin County should remember that they will be called upon to say whether Franklin County officers shall remain on salary or be put on fees in the November election. Under the provision of the bill you will have to vote for the present salaries or for fees. The trick in this situation is to get the present salaries approved by a vote of the people. You should vote for salaries as a principle and not consider the amount as they stand.

TAXATION—II

Every member of the General Assembly and every person who shall be chosen or appointed to hold any office of trust or profit in the state, shall before taking his seat or entering upon the executive of the office, take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation. "I, A. B. do solemnly and sincerely swear (or affirm) that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to the State of North Carolina, and to the Constitutional powers and authorities which are or may be established for the government thereof; and that I will endeavor to support, maintain and defend the Constitution of said State, not inconsistent with the Constitution of the United States, to the best of my knowledge and ability; so help me God."

This is from the Consolidated Statutes of North Carolina and has been the law ever since the year 1731.

The Constitution provides. Laws shall be passed taxing by a uniform rule, all moneys, credits, investments in bonds, stocks, joint-stock companies, or otherwise; and also, all real and personal property, according to its true value in money. Art. 5, Sec. 2.

There are in North Carolina 5200 corporations and the value of the stocks in 4334 of these is \$92,467,381 as reported to the United States Government. The valuations of 865 corporations have not yet been returned or reported to the U. S. Government. Including the stocks in companies incorporated in other states but doing business here, some of them very large, the total amount will approximate two thousand million dollars, that are absolutely free and bear no part of the burdens of government, state, county, municipal and special school and road districts. With the result that the whole burden of government is placed upon the real estate and visible property in the hands of the moral homesteaders and the cottage dwellers in the towns and cities of North Carolina. This burden is more than they can bear, and has become confiscatory, and the possession of real estate is a liability, and not an asset. Why is this large amount of property kept off the tax book? Because the tax levying powers of the state are under the absolute control of the corporations. And this evil has grown until one-half of the wealth of the state is invested in tax exempt securities. The legislative authority has usurped and set aside the plain provisions of the Constitution. There has been no one to protest against it, and until your undersigned brought his recent action against the Revenue Commissioner, our Supreme Court has had no opportunity to vitiate those provisions of the Constitution that declare that all taxes shall be uniform and equal. The rule of uniformity and equality has been violated by every Legislature since 1857, at which time the investment in corporation stocks were inconspicuous and limited. The subsidized Press of North Carolina is in favor of continuing this infamy, they won't even publish the facts nor the arguments in favor of upholding the Constitution. A certain candidate for the next Governorship of North Carolina, declared last week in public speech that he was opposed to having the stocks of corporations in the hands of individual owners for taxation, showing his utter unwillingness for this, high and honorable position. If all this large amount of untaxed wealth was placed on the tax books for ad valorem taxation by a uniform rule as provided for by the Constitution and let the Board of Commissioners of Franklin County fix the rates as they attempted to do in 1921, we would have enough revenue to run the expenses of North Carolina for two years, without any further taxation. And it is now necessary to pay high taxes for the past three

Years then the poor homesteader and his land could rest, for he has borne the burden alone and unaided. The sin and evils of revolution have their counterpart in the so called scheme of "segregation," that is let the state have all the income, inheritance and income taxes, leaving the lands in the counties to pay ever dollar for county government, and all the road and school taxes, and it is said that there is collected for these purposes thirty million dollars per year. And there is no escape for the poor tax payer. This infamous scheme by which one-half of the wealth is exempt from taxes, and the other half doubly and thrice taxed, can and ought not to receive the endorsement of any man, who has ever sworn to maintain and support the Constitution of his state. It is worse than war, pestilence, famine or the boil weevil, and unless corrected will finally crush, destroy and make slaves of every farmer and landowner in North Carolina. There is a remedy, and I will try to present it in my next letter.

THE CROSS TRIUMPHANT

An unusual attraction in Raleigh during fair week will be the religious pageant, "The Cross Triumphant," which will be given Tuesday afternoon and night, October 17th, on St. Mary's Campus. In case of rain it will be given in the city auditorium. More than 500 persons from all parts of North Carolina will take part in the pageant.

The pageant is a series of moving tableaux showing the progress of Christianity in Old England and America. It is based partly upon history and partly upon tradition, and written by Mrs. Marietta Minnigode Andrews, of Washington, D. C.

The opening picture, sponsored by Mrs. T. W. Bickett, shows Joseph of Arimathea, who had come to the British Isles in the first century, and planted there the staff of Christianity, cut from the tree of the Crown of Thorns.

Then follows the early days of persecutions of Christians, and the sixth century auction block in the market place of Rome, where children of England are sold, and the Benedictine monk, Gregory, touched by the sight of the slavery market, resolved to carry the gospel of Christ to England.

In the fourth picture, Gregory, having become Pope, fulfills his earlier promise, and sends St. Augustine, who, in the Kingdom of Kent, he is welcomed by Queen Bertha, a French Princess, whose husband, King Ethelbert, accepts for his dominion the faith of the Crucified One.

This picture will be sponsored by the Community Players of Raleigh. Miss Elizabeth Dorch will be Queen Bertha. Through the period of early Christianity in the British Isles, the theme of religious fervor winds its way up to the time of the Crusaders when the tomb of the Savior is rescued from infidel hands by the imperious Richard Plantagenet, of the "Lion Heart."

The scene then shifts to America. Sir Walter Raleigh comes to Roanoke, North Carolina, thus opening the way for the church in the New World. Christian baptism being administered to Virginia Dare.

Particularly interesting will be the fifteenth picture showing the founding of St. Mary's School in 1842 in Raleigh. The thirteen original students arrive in a stage coach drawn by four horses, and loaded with trunks, hand boxes, and fodder for the horses. Dr. and Mrs. Aldert Smodes, founders of the School, are present to receive the girls. Through the Civil War period, and up to the recent days of conflict, goes the thread of the drama. The climax is reached in the "Christmas Story in No-Man's Land," where the entrenchment of dough-boys beheld the spirit of Christianity hovering above the battle field, shining with a new light. "The Cross Triumphant," beckons from a nearby hillside. Climbing the steep ascent is a little child, followed by the peoples of all the ages, saints and sinners, kings and beggars, all nations and all faiths, gather on the hillside in the shadow of the Cross.

Appropriate music and costumes will be fitted to each part in the pageant.
