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#### FROM PILOT

The people of this community have been trying for several weeks to get themselves ready to put up a new school building. We now have something definite to put before the public. We are going to have a new school building, and that right soon, unless somebody throws a monkey wrench into the machinery.

This building was started by the propaganda of several far-sighted persons of the community who saw the need of a new building and believed that it could be put up in spite of the fact that all recent efforts along that line had failed. Now we can fairly see the building on the site that has been chosen. The first meeting of the people of the community was held on Tuesday night, Oct. 24th. At this meeting those present, presided over by the pastor of the local church Rev. A. A. Pippin, voted to put up a brick building and the present site enlarged was the preference of all for the location. A building committee was chosen whose duty it was to see that the spark thus kindled should be blown into a flame. This committee was composed of Messrs. O. D. Stallings, chairman, J. P. Massey, W. L. Phillips, Lonnie Jones and L. R. Vann.

Since that time the committee then appointed has not failed to do its duty. Of several plans of buildings that were furnished by the county one has been chosen and turned over to a contractor to make an estimate of the cost of erection, the county furnishing all material. Three and a half acres of land have been promised adjoining the one acre that the present building is on.

A second meeting of the people of the community was held last Monday night, Nov. 13th. At that meeting a secretary and a treasurer were elected to look after the business end of the proposition. Two members of the original committee, having made known the desire to be taken from the committee on account of distance from the school, were taken off and two members of the school committee were chosen in their stead. The committee as it now stands is composed of the following: Messrs. O. D. Stallings, chairman, J. P. Williams, J. B. Alford, L. R. Vann and J. P. Massey. The two last named were elected secretary and treasurer respectively. The duties of these were also extended. They are to see the people of the school District and solicit funds in the form of cash money and work to carry out the communally part of the erection of the building. One hundred and five dollars were collected in cash money from the fourteen persons present to pay for the land that has been promised and surveyed. The above amount was all in small amounts ranging from five to twenty-five dollars.

We are all very much encouraged over the prospects of a new building and hope to begin work immediately.


