

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

MET IN LOUISBURG, JUNE 14TH AND 15TH

Greensboro Division of The Baptist Denomination; Each Session of a High and Pleading Order; Many in Attendance.

The first meeting of the Greensboro Division of the Woman's Missionary Union of the Baptist Denomination was called to order by the Vice President, Mrs. Martin W. Buck, of Burlington in the chair.

Mrs. Wesley W. Jones, of Raleigh, State President, conducted the Devotional meeting using Jacob's three visions of God as her subject.

Mrs. J. A. McIver of Lenoir rendered a beautiful solo. How Many Sheep are straying lost from the Shepherd's Fold.

The address of welcome was given by Mrs. Wingate Underhill, of Louisburg, in well chosen words making all visitors feel at home.

Miss Wynona Chaine of Durham responded most appropriately. The choir sang a very appropriate selection.

Mrs. McIver gave us a beautiful glimpse into the life of the work at the Southwestern Training School, after which we sang one verse of "Nearer My God to Thee."

Then Mrs. Buck introduced Miss Ruth Jinks who had charge of the Training School Program. After a short introduction Miss Jinks then gave the origin and history of the school in the Pioneer days.

She then introduced Miss Wynona Chaine now Pastor's assistant in Durham. She gave us a beautiful picture of the busy life in the Training School, speaking on the subject, "The General Program of the School."

Following Miss Chaine, Miss Pearl Taylor, of Oxford, spoke, subject being "The Religious Life and Y. W. A. of the Training School." Then Miss Sigmon of Wake Forest so beautifully pictured the settlement work, emphasizing especially the "Good Will Center Work operated and conducted by the Training School Girls."

Following Miss Sigmon, Miss Cora Lee Cannon of West Durham, carried us through House Beautiful explaining each memorial and introducing us to the wonderful Faculty and just how the school is run.

She told us that it is through love and sacrifice from the Great Mother hearts all over the southland that these gifts are sent to aid the expense of the school.

Many touching and pleasant incidents were beautifully pictured by the girls in turn, which will help us to catch the vision of sacrifice willingness, and unselfishness in service, as they labored in the mission sections in Louisville.

Mrs. Myers of Spring Hope, gave us a striking picture of the married students in the Seminary and Training School Life.

Miss Jinks then gave the qualifications for entrance in the Training School, then in her brave, sweet, spirited way gave a pleading call for more scholarships to the training school, given by either Association or Church.

Following a few remarks by Mrs. Buck we were then dismissed with the Mizpah Benediction.

Miss Thompson of the Beulah Association conducted the devotional using hymn, "Come Thou Almighty King." After leading a most impressive prayer, she read a scripture selection found in the 24th chapter of Luke. A hymn "Close to the Master" was sung by the congregation.

Mrs. Buck using the map explained some of the work done in eight associations in the Greensboro Division. Then using her chart she was able to show still greater work that is being done in the Division, and showing some of the needs as well.

The Associational Problem questions were asked and answered by Mrs. Buck, and Mrs. Jones. They explained very definitely what was done with the State and Associated Expense Fund. Mrs. Buck explained how the superintendents could assist in helping the society. Mrs. Jones asked the question, "Can the time of your associational meeting be changed in this Division so that our Officers can attend." Her suggestion was that the superintendents of the association and officers confer with each other and arrange so that State Officers could attend.

Mrs. Charles E. Maddy presented and discussed personal service, stressing the giving of our time and talent to this work giving some scripture reading from Job after which she told us of the need of personal service in ourselves, for the sake of our spiritual life need of our church need of humanity around us, intellectual need, social need, and greatest need, spiritual need. We can best meet these needs through our personal service work.

The presentation of the banner, won by the Mt. Zion Association of the Greensboro Division. The hour having arrived for the conference the congregation dispersed to different parts of the church for discussions.

Committee on resolutions. Mrs. John Kemp of Wakefield, Mrs. J. W. Bunn of Raleigh, Mrs. R. M. Squires of Wake Forest. Closing prayer by Miss Cora Lee Cannon.

Afternoon Session Opened at 1:20 by devotional exercise led by Miss Pearl Taylor, Supt. of Flat River Association. Scripture Lesson: 1 Peter 5, 1-12. Hymns: More Like The Master, O Master Let Me Walk With Thee. Subject: Tend the flock of God that is among you. Treasurer report. Committee on Enrollment asked to report at end of session. White Cross work discussed by Mrs. Z. W. Caveness.

Letter from Miss Grayson Supr. of K. Thelen Mallory Hospital, read, telling of opening of Hospital. Prayer for Miss Grayson, and the K. M. Hospital, led by Mrs. W. C. Cullom, of Wake Forest. Mrs. J. T. Michener Supt. of Central Ass'n. explained Standards of Excellence for various organizations, and how they can be used to advantage, urging definite goals to be set by associations after standard reports have been submitted. Mrs. Wingate Underhill, Louisburg, continued this discussion, insisting on regularly marking up reports, so as to be accurate in record. Mrs. Underhill plead for common sense application of this standard; for instance meetings weekly are omitted for unavoidable reasons, may be made up during the year; a society that has every woman in its church enrolled may answer yes to the question about 10 per cent increase of members. Every society was urged to have committee on Literature, whose church is to keep permanent record of subscriptions see that literature is read and reported on in societies. Mrs. Buck outlined plan for completing mission study book in one all day meeting. Recommendation one person in charge of Standard Chart, to mark up after each monthly meeting and see that chart is on hand at every meeting place.

Discussion of Auxiliary Conference by Mrs. Buck, and announcement of Mt. Zion Auxiliary conference at Chapel Hill June 28th. Miss Mary Warren could not be present for this discussion.

Miss Ann Lassiter, Waco, Texas, was introduced by Mrs. McIver. Miss Lassiter had just arrived in Louisburg from Richmond, where she had been appointed as missionary to Chili, South America, to be sent out this summer.

In absence of Mrs. A. C. Howell, Mrs. Buck discussed Mission study giving plan for circulating library of Sunbeams, and helpful list of books for Juniors, delightful sketches of books and outlines for teaching. A list of books was given.

Report of Convention: Time and Place, 1st week in May, date and place to be announced later in Recorder.

Resolutions. Enrollment, 102 delegates from 6 associations. The committee on Resolutions makes the following report:

Resolved: First: That we the representation of the Greensboro Division of the W. M. U. of North Carolina here register our appreciation of the many kindnesses and courtesies extended us in these Louisburg homes and at the bountiful luncheon served today. We ask God's blessing upon them and upon the work of the whole Association.

Mt. Etna In Eruption

Catania, Italy, June 19.—The great lava torrent from Mount Etna, bearing in its flow great masses of earth and volcanic stone, is advancing inexorably and has already reached the houses on the outskirts of the town of Linguaglossa.

Green fields, orange groves and vine yards have been swallowed up, and for miles around the atmosphere is suffocating with volcanic smoke and a rain of black smoke and ashes which is covering the countryside like a pall.

Several smaller houses in Linguaglossa have been shaken down by the frequent earth shocks and the once smiling little town, which until the last it was thought might be spared, is directly in the line of the lava and is doubtless doomed to destruction.

The molten stream is traveling about 40 yards an hour and therefore unless some miracle happens, Linguaglossa will go under during the night. Confronting it is a lava bed 560 yards wide and nearly 30 feet deep.

Smaller torrents of lava, diverted from the central stream, threaten the villages of Randazzo and Bronte, from which so many tourists make the ascent of Etna, Fracavilla, Castiglione, Giardini and Pume Fraggio.

People Reluctant To Go The work of clearing the threatened towns is being carried out with the greatest energy and admirable organization. Discipline is necessary to induce the terrified inhabitants to abandon their beloved homes, but their removal is carried out with sympathy and kindness. Airplanes are being used for the first time to watch the progress of the eruption and special signaling stations have been established at various strategic points giving confidence to the people in the fact that they are being protected.

Special units of the Red Cross, with supplies, have been dispatched to care for the homeless wanderers and provide food and shelter for them.
