RECIPE FOR HEALTH TAUGHT TO STUDENTS

"Take One Average School Girl Then Daily:—
Three Wholesome Meals,
Eight Glasses of Water,
Ten hours of sleep,
At least two hours of play,
and
An abundance of H2O in forms of Baths
Mix ingredients with regularity and care;
Sprinkle with plenty of fresh air and sunshine;
Garnish liberally with snow or green grass;
and
Season well with smiles;
Serve in happy surroundings as A well-browned, rosy-cheeked American Girl."

This is a recipe for health as it appeared in a news letter issued from the school of home economics at the North Dakota Agricultural College.

This health recipe is also posted on the bulletin boards of many of the high schools of that state, reports Mrs. Jane S. McKimmon, State Agent in charge of Home Demonstration work for the State College and Department of Agriculture.

"The question of health is being stressed in all of our work this year," said Mrs. McKimmon. "In each unit of work the item of good health is brought up as being very important. In clothing classes the subject of hygienic clothes is discussed and in cooking and nutrition classes the question of healthful foods receives attention. All of the Smith-Hughes schools and many others in the state are stressing more and more the question of health. We feel that this is an important part of home demonstration work as conducted in North Carolina."

PROBLEM FOR LEAGUE OF NATIONS SETTLED IN COURT ROOM HERE

Yesterday in criminal court the case of Anna Besgovich, charged with felonious assault and battery on Mary Menclovich, was called for trial. Both parties live in Indianola.

Mrs. Besgovich is an American-born woman, of Irish extraction, but married to a Serbian. Mary is a Bohemian, and her husband a Dalmatian. Witnesses for the commonwealth were Polish, American and Negro persons, while the defendant's witnesses were Hungarians, Magyars, Poles and Croats. The district attorney was an American of German extraction, while the defendant's lawyer and the judge were Jews. They found Mrs. Besgovich guilty of aggravated assault and battery. She will be sentenced later.

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LONG STAPLE SOLD

Raleigh, Dec. 18.—The North Carolina Cotton Growers' Cooperative Association has finally sold its stock of Long Staple cotton of the 1922 crop and just as soon as the accounting department can make up the statements a final settlement for this cotton will be made with every member who delivered Long staple cotton last season. Approximately 6,000 bales of Long staple was handled and much of it was of low grade staple making the sale of this grade very slow. Final settlement was made on short staple cotton of the 1922 crop some time ago.
