CITIZENS' MILITARY TRAINING CAMP.

Fort Bragg, N. C., July 13.—The CITIZENS' MILITARY TRAINING CAMP at Fort Bragg is now well under way and the young men from the cight south-eastern states are browning up like veterans. The out-of-doors life is evidently to the liking of the

young men.
At 5:30 every morning, the candidates hear the first strains of the bugle and in fifteen minutes all are dressed and assembled for roll call. They are given a quarter of an physical drill followed by breakfast which is waiting them in the "mess-

which is waiting them in the "messtent." The call for mess is one time
when no difficulty is experienced in
securing a prompt and full attendance.
The camp is then "policed" or cleaned-up and drill starts promptly at 7:30.
During thepast week the Basic candidates have been given a course in
citizenship and first aid, dismounted
drill, instruction in how to handle a
rifle, preparatory to actual firing on
the target range, and movies lilustrating these various subjects. The Red
Course men have been instructed in
the same subjects excepting for the
rifle. In addition they have been at
ristol target practice, mounted instruc ristol target practice, mounted instruc-tion learning draft and equitation, and enclature of the French 75s which they will fire on the range later in the course. The White, or third year, students had advanced instruction in equitation and mounted drill, topography and orientation teaching them graphy and orientation teaching them how to read maps, and communications and reconnaissance. In all drills they act in the capacity of corporals. The Blue, or senior, trainees have covered the same subjects as the Whites but of an advanced nature and it addition have had field artillery gunnery so that they will be qualified to conduct the firing of the 75s when they go on the range. At drills they act as Sergeants.

act as Sergeants.

At noon all drill has been completed for the Basics and Reds, the Whites finish at 2:30 and the Blue at 3:30 P M. When drills are over, the men are engaged in various types of ath-letics. Swimming and the Red Cross Life Saving Course have an carollment of over 500 candidates. A base ball league, boxing classes and tennis tournament have been started and have their quota of enthusiasts. It is the policy of General Bowley to have evof athletics to his physical betterment.

On Wednesday, July 8th, the C. M. T. C. had its first Dress Parade and the showing of the young men was far above the expectations of the regular army instructors. Over half of the men never had had military training yet after a weeks work their appearance was exceedingly creditable,— 1000 tanned young Americans in uni-

Saturday evening, July 11th, was featured by a dance for the students sponsored by Mrs. Wills, the C. M. T. C. Hostess who is looking after the welfare of the young men. The religious side of camp life is

administered by three chaplains. Attendance at church is not compulsory but it is a noteworthy fact that most

of the men attend all services. Wednesday, July 15th, is designated as Governor's Day at which time the activities of the camp will be inspected by the Honorable Angus McLean, Governor of North Carolina.

The health of the command is exceptionally good there being no cases of serious illness, the ailments reported being of a minor nature.

Visitors' Day will be July 29th, and

an interestingprogram has been arranged which will appeal to the parents and friends of the candidates.
