 Evelyn Nesbit Thaw attempted suicide in New York Tuesday by taking poison.
 Z. L. Cheaves, of Harris township, reports killing six shoats weighing 290, 288, 282, 309, 260, 300.
 Franklin Superior Court convenes Monday with Judge M. V. Barnhill of Nashville presiding.
 Cotton growers in convention in Atlanta this week want an average cut of 25 per cent for 1926.
 M. D. Smith, of Gold Mine township reports killing hogs weighing as follows: 394, 330, 314, 306.
 James I. McKnight, one of Franklinton township's progressive colored farmers reports killing four hogs weighing 247, 234, 233 and 210.
