HOLD COUNTY CONVENTION

Democrats Met in Louisburg Saturday

Mr. Edward F. Griffin Presided as Chairman, A. F. Johnson as Secretary, Delegates Named to State and Congressional Conventions; Hon. W. M. Person Presents Taxation Resolution; Laments Death of R. L. Stokes

The Democratic County Convention held in Louisburg on Saturday presented a most interesting and enthusiastic gathering. Quite a large crowd was present and the delegates for both State and Congressional Conventions were selected. A resolution presented by Hon. W. M. Person, recommending to our legislators to use their efforts to have all tax exempt securities placed on the tax books for taxation purposes was carried with a record vote.

The convention was called to order by Chairman E. H. Malone who after stating the object of the meeting called Mr. Edward F. Griffin as temporary chairman and A. F. Johnson, temporary secretary.

Mr. Griffin accepted in a most interesting and enthusiastic little speech after which the temporary organization was made permanent.

Upon roll call all townships were found to be represented except Hayesville.

Chairman E. H. Malone, of the County Executive Committee made very interesting remarks on the life and democratic service of Mr. R. L. Stokes, of Hayesville township, whose death occurred on Friday and moved that a committee be appointed to draft suitable resolutions. The motion was unanimously carried and the chairman appointed E. H. Malone, Arthur Strickland and L. O. Frazier as the committee.

Upon motion the convention went into the election of delegates to the State and Congressional Conventions.

tion of the wealth of the State is exempt from taxation, thus imposing all the burdens of government and schools on the visible property to such an extent that the present costs of taxation is destructive and confiscatory. It is by this convention resolved that our members of the General Assembly be and they are hereby recommended and urged to repeal all laws exempting the stocks and bonds in North Carolina.

The resolution was discussed by Messrs S. A. Newell, E. H. Malone and C. C. Hudson.

Upon a second by C. R. Sandling, the motion carried.

The convention gave rising vote of thanks to the two ladies who attended the convention as delegates for being present.
