TEN USUAL REASONS FOR POULTRY FAILURES

Raleigh, Sept. 27.—When farm poultry flocks are given the right attention, the grower meets with success in his efforts; but, lack of attention to the flock nearly always results in failure to produce profits.

"Ninety percent of the calls we get for help with poultry are caused from lack of attention to simple details in handling the flock," says Allen G. Oliver, poultry extension specialist at State College. "Rarely do we get a call from those thousands of farmers who care for their birds the right attention. I were to sum up the most prevailing causes of failure, I would list the following ten:

"The poultry house allowed to be dark, damp and drafty.

Drinking fountains or troughs allowed to be dirty and filthy or the birds drink from stagnant pools of water.

Lack of fresh air and sunshine, nature's disinfectants, in the house.

Failure to clean and disinfect the house at regular intervals.

Keeping the flock penned up in unsanitary houses and yards.

As a progressive Dairyman desiring to secure maximum profits from my milk herd, I realize the necessity of adhering to an organized schedule of care, feeding and handling.

My first step should be the selection of a true type herd—a selection which should always command great care and good judgment.

During the hot months, whenever possible, I shall supply my herd with a cool, clean, outside resting place, where they may chew their cud in peace and ruminate on the blessings of being a parasite.

A clean condition like that pictured here shall never prevail in my herd. Rather than scrape, curry and brush outdoors, I shall clip and quickly clean thoroughly by wiping with a damp cloth.

A clean herd, clean with a regular bedding, water at the trough and clean and up milk-ings within an hour of feeding are all part of the program which I shall enforce rigidly.

The dairy is an industry that demands the highest quality and quantity of milk as much as I do. They must come from the point beyond which I have the control.

When my milk is bottled I shall know I am producing for my customer. I shall get more milk and more money for my milk and my good will shall be spread throughout the land.

Proper feeding is essential. Therefore I shall always provide a carefully balanced ration for my herd. I shall supply them with clean water.

The growth in the number of cow testing associations convinces me that membership in one is a good thing. I pledge my association full support and co-operation.

The comfort of the animal is important. Through clean air and clean bedding about the udders and under the flaps of the body when turning out in the spring shall be part of my program. Clean animal, clean milk with low bacteria count.
