have been awarded a judgment of \$647,161.85 in the suit filed against he government and former Collector Bailey \$433,865.61 in the suit against the government and Collector Grissom which they claim was overpaid in income taxes by the Cannon estate during the years 1918 and 1919.

Trustees of the estate are Charles A. Connon, of Concord, and David H. Blair,, of Winston-Salem and Washington, the combined amount repre sented in the judgment signed here during the week by Judge Isaac M. Mockins of the Federal Court is J. 981,027.26. The suit has been pend-ng in the Federal Court for ten years and the agreed verdict ends a legal battle between the ablect lawyers of New York and North Carolina, one of whom was Charles E. Hughest, republican candidate for the presidency against Woodrow Wilson in 1916 and hailed as the winner the night before California announced the result which gave Mr. Wilson a second term. The report of this County Advisory

The report of The County Advisory Commission recently given the o. k. indicates that not more than twentyone counties have attained high efficiency in government and the county government laws passed by the last legislature ,and that the laws enacted are widely disregarded and out of harmony with the general idea of improved methods of county finance. And, of course, the State Commission recommends an increase in the staff of workers with the view to closer contact with the counties which is expected to result in the elimination of tax methods of enforcing the law. The Commission finds the daily deposit feature of the county government laws infpracticable in many counties and that only a few more than half the countles are complying with the law requiring each purchasing order to carry a statement that provision for payment had been made by appropriation covered by authorized bonds or notes. Few of the counties are found to have made complete settlement of taxes on dates required by statute and in many of them land sales for taxes were prevented by restraining orders, or postponed by per. mission of the local commissioners.
