**Farmers Meeting at Gold Sand**  
On the past Thursday night at the regular farmers meeting those present continued the discussion of purebred cotton. The first steps toward the growing of a better type of cotton have been taken. A number of farmers have engaged purebred Mexican Big Boll Seed to plant the coming spring. By growing a better type of cotton in the community farmers can get better prices than the ordinary cotton will bring.

The best seed cannot succeed unless all the practices during the entire crop year are carefully carried out. The farmers are going to pay particular attention to the following points in connection with the cotton crop—good seed, proper preparation, proper fertilization, spacing and cultivation, control of insects and diseases, careful picking and housing, selecting seed, ginning, and selling.

Several more meetings will be held at Gold Sand on Thursday nights at 7:30 and at Wood on Wednesday nights. All farmers in the community are invited to take advantage of these meetings.
