

LOUISBURG CHAMBER COMMERCE HOLDS MEETING

The Louisburg Chamber of Commerce held its regular monthly meeting in the Court House, at 7:30 p. m., September 10th with President F. J. Beasley, presiding and twenty one members present.

President Beasley reported that the Finance Committee, appointed by the Chamber of Commerce to assist the Franklin County Historical Assn. in its Sesqui Centennial Celebration, raised \$350.00 toward financing the celebration. A motion was made by S. P. Boddie, that the Chamber extend its thanks to President Beasley for his efficient work. The motion carried and a rising vote of thanks was tendered Chairman Beasley.

M. S. Davis, Chmn, reported for the Roads Committee that a small stretch of road from Ransoms Bridge to the Junction of the Halifax Highway and the highway to Rocky Mount was in an unimproved condition and that this committee had taken the matter up with Messrs. Gardner and Collie with the view of having this bit of road put into an improved condition by the State Highway crew that is at work in that vicinity at present.

A motion was made by L. L. Joyner that Mr. Davis have full authority from the Chamber of Commerce, to proceed with his efforts to secure improvement of this piece of road. The motion carried.

A motion by M. S. Davis prevailed, instructing the Secretary to write Mr. Hill a letter of thanks for his support and assistance to the Chamber of Commerce in its requests for various road legislation in Franklin County. The Marketing Committee reported that the Southside Warehouse had been leased to an able and active group of tobacco warehousemen.

The Sect. was instructed to write to Mr. Fred Morris of Franklinton, and to thank him and all others responsible for it, for the repainting of the Louisburg Sign, which was despoiled by unknown parties. Also to offer to reimburse Mr. Morris for the expense involved.

L. L. Joyner, reported that the Town of Louisburg is having automobile Courtesy Cards printed, which are to be distributed by our Police Department.

E. H. Malone moved that the Secretary write to every tobacco man in Louisburg and request their attendance at Chamber of Commerce meetings, and their co-operation with the Chamber in its efforts to build up our tobacco market. The motion carried.

The following Committee was appointed to formulate plans for a barbecue to be given to the tobacco men in the near future, and to present their plan to the Chamber of Commerce at its next regular meeting. S. P. Boddie, W. R. Mills, T. K. Stockard.

A discussion of the pending Advertising Budget and plan resulted in instructions being issued to the Publicity and Finance Committees to get to work in the carrying out of the accepted plan and budget.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned.
