ard, 22,287.

Josiah W. Bailey, who won the Democratic nomination for United States Senator, carried eighty-four of the 100 counties and had a majority of 67,775 over his two opponents, Doctor Estep, the wet candidate, did not carry a single county and received only 2,592 votes in the entire State. Senator Simmons received 133,375 votes and carried the following counties: Caswell, Craven, Forsyth, Hertford, Hyde, Iredell, Jones, Lenoir, Mecklenburg, New Hanover, Onslow, Pender, Richmond, Robeson, and Wilson. The Senator and his managers over the State have pledged support to the successful contestant in the general engagement to follow with the Republicans, 332,709 votes were cast for the three aspirants for the Senatorship in the recent Democratic primary, or around 50,000 more than Governor Smith received in the State two years ago. Democrats consider this most encouraging.

Comparatively few second primaries have been requested in the counties and districts of the State. In the Ninth congressional Hamilton C. Jones, second in the race, asks for another round with Major A. L. Bulwinkle, and T. D. Bryson, Jr., candidate for solicitor in the Twentieth Judicial District, requests a second race with John M. Queen, of Wayneville, leader in the first primary. Many "runner-ups" have retired in the interest of peace.

Governor O. Max Gardner decides to forego the pleasure of a trip to Salt Lake City, Utah, later in the month for a meeting of the Council of Governors on July 2nd, and promises to address the Democratic State convention here on the 5th. Former Associate Justice of the Supreme Court L. R. Varner, of Lumberton, accepts the invitation of Chairman Mdlj to preside over the convention temporarily which means that he will deliver the key-note speech. Josiah W. Bailey, the senatorial nominee, is also on the program for an address. The adoption of a platform is the only business of importance to be considered, but following adjournment the convention the newly elected State executive councillor, will be granted a leave of absence long enough to conduct the fall campaign.

On invitation of Governor Gardner, Secretary of Agriculture Arthur M. Hyde, a member of President Hoover's cabinet, joined a group of State officials, North Carolina editors and agricultural experts on an inspection trip over Caledonia and other prison farms in the State during the week. The Caledonia Farm contains over 9,000 acres of fine agricultural lands and is providing maintenance for more than 700 of the State's prisoners. Hundreds of bales of cotton and thousands of bushels of corn, wheat and potatoes are produced annually on it, while the farm is also being used for experiments

based on the percentage of gross earnings received in this state.

Young farmers of North Carolina, constituting an organization some three years old, met here during the week 200 strong, discussed the "Future Farmers of America," awarded degrees to members for outstanding work during the year and talked about "Co-operative Marketing as a Solution of Farm Problems." The highest degree awarded was for two years of agricultural construction with savings of \$300 and an average grade of 85 per cent on school subjects. The North Carolina organization is made up of 123 local chapters and represents a high school membership of around 3,500, it is said.

School Facts adduces figures showing that 121,291 school children were enrolled in the first grades of the white schools of the State during 1928-29, or 20.4 of the total enrollment of the white children. Total enrollment for the period was 595,747. Enrollment of white children in the lower grades is said to be on the decline.

Road building in the State continues right along and surprise detours bob-up to plague the motorist "most any old time" these days. The State Highway Commission recently let bids on ten road projects involving an expenditure of \$878,000, one of which involves the construction of 6.14 miles of 20-foot paved road from Waughtown to Kernersville in Forsyth county. Contract for the paving of 9.99 miles of 16-foot road in Pitt county along Route 30, from the Craven County line to Cox's Mill, was deferred. Also the building of a new bridge across the Roanoke River in Halifax County at Roanoke Rapids. The recent letting includes 23.75 miles of hard-surface roads and 53.31 miles of soil and gravel surfacing. The counties involved are Rockingham, Anson, Davie, Iredell, Mecklenburg, Union, Forsyth Pitt and Watauga. A commercial survey with a view to pushing the Cape Fear channel project has been started, with J. B. Dempsey, Washington traffic expert, directing the collection of data. Survey of the river is already in progress and it is said that, with a 12-foot channel to Fayetteville, it will be possible to secure water transportation rates from points in the mid-west along the Ohio River and other streams as well as connections with the inter-coastal waterway, now being completed to the Cape Fear at Wilmington.

The Department of Labor and Printing announces through Commissioner Grist that the State-Federal employment offices in Greensboro and Winston-Salem are to be closed July 1st because of the 20 per cent cut in budgets of state departments on request of Governor Gardner who does not want the State to operate at a loss. R. D. Dixon, assistant federal director of employment, is also slated for retirement at the close of the fiscal year.
