Adopt Plans at Meeting In Franklin Recorder's Court-Louisburg Friday — College To Continue.

The Board of Trustees of Louisburg College in session at the College, December 2, 1930, in pursance of the expression of the North Carolina Conference in a resolution passed by the Conference Monday, November 24, adopted the following plan to raise approximately \$12,600.00 for the operation of the Collego for the spring term beginning Wednesday, January 21, 1931. This action was taken by the Trustees subject to the approval and cotees subject to the approval and co-operation of the Presiding Elders, pastors and people of the Confer-

This plan was approved and adopted by special resolution at the Durham district set-up meeting Wednesday, December 3. It is expected that similar action will be taken at meetings to be held in other districts of the Conference during the next few days.
