Immediately following the program the association went into its business meeting. Under unfinished business the Association gladly received the report of the committee to equip a sick-room, which will be attractively and comfortably fitted up during the holidays.

Under new business the Association heartily and unanimously endorsed the objectives of the State congress of Parents and Teachers which are expressed thusly:

- 1. A minimum school term of eight months for all North Carolina children. 2. Required attendance to age of sixteen years unless sixth grade is completed or child is excused as provided by law because of inability to profit by further schooling.

Mrs. Carter, president, in well-chosen terms and in deep sincerity of tone, expressed her Christmas wish of happiness, prosperity and renewed spirit of service and loyalty to each member of the organization.

The assembly was dismissed with The Lord's Prayer repeated in unison.

Youngville Elementary School Working Toward Standardization

Among these are; sufficient number of pupils and teachers; an adequate building; all teachers professionally qualified; part of the equipment by way of maps, and library facilities; and, the course of study followed as nearly as possible with the present equipment.
