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EHRINGHAUS AND REYNOLDS LEAD

Morrison Only 11,444 Behind While Fountain is 52,529 Behind His Opponent—Nothing Definite About Second Primary For State, But Is Probable.

Robert R. Reynolds and Senator Cameron Morrison have already begun preparations for a second primary on July 2 for the United States Senatorial nomination with assurance of a heated contest.

Returns from all except 16 of the 1,323 precincts in the State last night showed that Reynolds had 150,049 votes; Senator Morrison 138,605; Judge Tam C. Bowie, 37,990; Commissioner of Labor, Frank D. Grist, 28,550; and Arthur Simmons, 3,875.

Little change is expected when the official vote is announced on Friday, the meeting of the State Board of Elections having been advanced one day on account of the county convention which will be held Saturday.

Senator Morrison has not yet formally announced that he will exercise his right under the law and demand a second primary, but it is considered certain that he will do so.

Lieutenant Governor Richard T. Fountain who was in Raleigh yesterday, reiterated his former statement that he will take no position on a second primary until after announcement of the official vote.

With 15 of the 1,323 precincts missing, the vote last night stood: J. C. E. Ehringhaus, 165,942; Fountain, 113,113 and Revenue Commissioner A. J. Maxwell, 100,875.

Returns from 1,607 precincts for other State offices showed the nomination of A. H. "Sandy" Graham, speaker of the State House of Representatives in 1929 for lieutenant governor. The vote was, Graham, 177,157; Giles, 47,797 and Dellinger, 51,817.

Stacy Wade appeared certain of nomination for Secretary of State, but there were still enough votes to be accounted for to upset him should they all be adverse. This was considered unlikely, as he had piled up a 23,000 lead on returns from every section of the State. He had 148,126 to 124,815 for Hartness, incumbent.

Baxter Durham continued to hold a commanding lead for State auditor but did not have a clear majority. He had 129,113 to 84,924 for Chester Bell and 48,945 for George Adams. More complete returns received personally by Mr. Durham indicated he has a clear majority over both opponents of between 7,000 and 10,000.

Attorney General Dennis G. Brummitt appeared certain of renomination, having polled 180,954 to 71,199 for Peyton McSwain of Shelby.

In the race for commissioner of labor the vote stood: A. L. Fletcher, 63,909; Clarence E. Mitchell, 61,246; R. R. Lawrence, 52,840; John D. Norton, 37,557; W. Henry Davis, 28,601 and B. Fritz Smith, 19,039. A second primary in this race is regarded as certain.

Stanley Winborne appeared headed for certain renomination to the corporation commission, his vote being almost double that of E. C. Macon. The count was: Winborne, 151,289; Macon, 86,340.

Dan C. Boney, insurance commissioner, more than doubles his opponent, W. D. Morton. It stood: Boney 171,075; Morton, 81,794.

Primary Passes

Smoothly

The primary election held in Franklin County on last Saturday passed off smoothly at all precincts, according to reports received in Louisburg, with possibly the largest vote ever cast in the County. With the large number of candidates in the field the maximum interest was manifest and resulted in large numbers of citizens visiting the polls, many of whom remained throughout the day.

The counting of the ballots was a most arduous task and caused many to remain on the job all night. At Louisburg the count was not completed until after 6 o'clock Sunday morning.

Order Tax Sales

Town Preparing For Regular Annual Audit—To Settle With Allen Estate.

The Board of Town Commissioners met in regular session on Monday, June 6th, 1932 with all members present. The minutes of previous meetings were read and approved and business transacted as follows:

The question of postponement of Tax Sales of the 1931 taxes and the matter of answering the injunction that exists against this sale, came before the Board and was fully discussed. The following motion was set in order:

"That former orders from the Board to the Town Attorney as set forth in the minutes of the meeting of May, 20th, 1932 be rescinded; and that the Town Attorney now be ordered to represent the Town of Louisburg, N. C. and if possible to have the Court dissolve the injunction against the Town of Louisburg, N. C., selling the 1931 Taxes, at the hearing before Judge Harris on June, 7th, 1932 at Goldsboro, N. C.; and that the Tax Collector be ordered to proceed with the advertisement of the 1931 Taxes for sale on the 1st Monday in July, in the event that the injunction is dissolved." A roll call vote on this motion resulted as follows: Those voting "Aye": W. E. White, R. W. Smithwick, W. J. Cooper, M. C. Murphy; Those voting "No": A. W. Person, F. H. Allen. The motion was carried.

"The Town Clerk was instructed to give the P. S. Allen Estate, a note for the \$500.00 that is owed to the P. S. Allen Estate by the Town of Louisburg, N. C.

The Board instructed the Clerk to accept the Automobile Public Liability and Property Damage Policy No. 611602, U. S. F. & G. Co., which was tendered by Davis and Davis.

The Clerk was instructed to investigate the rate on Public Liability and Property Damage Insurance on the Fire Truck.

The Mayor and Auditing Committee were instructed to make a contract for the regular annual audit of the Town of Louisburg, N. C.

After allowing a number of accounts the Board adjourned.

Requests for a second primary have already been filed and it will be called for Saturday, July 2nd, and will probably be participated in by the two highest participants in the last primary, for the offices of Sheriff, Register of Deeds and Coroner. There will probably be one contest for township Constable, that being in Sandy Creek township where K. E. Joyner and Geo. P. Foster were the two highest.

The contestants for the three County offices are: For Sheriff—F. W. Justice and F. N. Spivey; for Register of Deeds Geo. W. Ford and T. Mort. Harris; for Coroner—C. B. Barham and J. W. Freeman.
