While peaches are plentiful try these recipes:

Peach Sweet Pickle
6 lbs. peaches, 3 lbs. sugar, 2 sticks cinnamon, 4 cloves to each peach, 1 pt. vinegar.
Plunge peaches in boiling water for three minutes. Let vinegar and sugar come to boiling point, drop peaches in and when tender put in jars, cover with the syrup and seal. Allow about fifteen minutes to cook.

Peach Delight
1 qt. ripe peaches, run thru a sieve, 1 qt. milk. Mix these together and flavor with desired flavoring, add crushed ice and top with whipped cream.
