

The Board of Education met on Monday with all members present. The minutes of last meeting were read and approved. The following resolution offered by E. L. Green and seconded by J. H. Joyner was carried:
"Whereas, it has come to the

attention of this Board that there has been circulated a report in the Pearce School Community to effect that this Board was considering the question of consolidation or abandonment of the Pearce School, and whereas such a report is absolutely false and, without foundation since no such question has been considered or even discussed by this Board, and whereas no such proposal has been made either by this Board or the County Superintendent of Schools to the State School Commission.

"Now therefore be it resolved: That this information be given uitable publicity." It was brought to the attention

of the Board that there were sev-eral abandoned school buildings in the county rapidly depreciating in value and that now was an opportune time to salvage these buildings with the help of funds
