**Soil Erosion Service**

High Point, Sept. 18—Counties of Eastern, Southern, and Central North Carolina are being visited by soil specialists of the Soil Erosion Service this week and next in a state-wide reconnaissance survey to obtain specific information as to severity of erosion and general land condition, according to Dr. J. H. Stallings, regional director of the Soil Erosion Service here.

W. D. Lee, who for the past month has made a similar survey in middle and western counties has moved into the southern central and piedmont counties. W. W. Stevens has been assigned to survey the eastern piedmont and coastal plain counties.

The erosion survey is being conducted to bring out principally the acreage of land abandoned due primarily to aggravated erosion, the severity of erosion, and the prevailing topography of each section, Dr. Stallings announced.

In 12 middle piedmont counties already surveyed the government has found 375,000 acres of severely eroded and abandoned land, and in 10 mountain counties upward of 350,000 acres were found seriously eroded and abandoned.
