

Louisburg Routs Norfolk Eleven

Trojans Get 45-0 Decision Over Braves in Home-Coming Day Grid Game.

Unleashing a powerful attack, the Louisburg College Trojans celebrated "Home-coming Day" Friday with a smashing 45-0 victory over the Norfolk Division, College of William and Mary-V. P. I.

With Richards, Hoyle, West, Davis and Gibson repeatedly breaking away for long gains, the Trojans scored in every quarter.

A 14-yard run by Davis after five minutes of play started the Trojans on their scoring spree and they were unstoppable thereafter.

Weldon and West were the spearheads in a 74-yard drive which had set the stage for Davis' opening touchdown.

The Trojans talked again in the second quarter, Richards traveling 12 yards to score after Weldon and Davis had alternated in carrying the ball into a 44-yard drive. Louisburg was at the Braves' one-yard line when the half ended, Boland having returned a punt at 21 yards to within a yard of goal.

Gibson ran 19 yards for one Trojan score, Puckett ran 24 yards for another. West counted on a five-yard trip, and another touchdown came when Gibson required just two stabs at the line to negotiate the 15 yards separating his team from goal. The first touchdown of the second half climaxed a 44-yard drive, Weldon doing the tallying.

Bulluck, Richards and Goodwin were best for the Trojans on offense. Valentine led the Braves.

Louisburg made 24 first downs to five for the Braves. The home team attempted only four passes, completing two for 17 yards. The Braves turning to the air 15 times, completing two for 48 yards and having three intercepted.
