

Production Increase

Detroit, Dec. 5.—Production of Chevrolet passenger cars and trucks for the model year 1934 will show an increase of approximately 25 per cent over corresponding figures for last year, it was announced here today by M. E. Coyle, president and general manager of the Chevrolet Motor Co.

Analysis of this production shows that all three Chevrolet lines—Master models, Standard models and trucks—made gains in 1934, the highest percentage of gain being registered by the Standard series, the world's lowest-priced six-cylinder car.

Some idea of the bearing which this added production has on the country's economic recovery may be gained from Mr. Coyle's statement that payrolls for the first 10 months were 45 per cent greater than for all of 1933. Wages and salaries paid to Chevrolet employees, up to November 1, totaled \$67,666,994.59, he said.

The greater part of the money accounted for in the present report, Mr. Coyle pointed out, went to productive labor employed in the Chevrolet manufacturing and assembly plants throughout the country. The figure represents Chevrolet's direct payrolls only. It does not, of course, touch the vast expenditures for materials used in Chevrolet products, nor does it include wages paid to employees of the Fisher Body Corporation, makers of bodies for Chevrolet cars, nor to the 50,000 sales and service employees of Chevrolet's 10,000 dealers blanketing the country from coast to coast.

AN ORDER AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$142,000.00 OF BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF FRANKLIN, NORTH CAROLINA, TO FUND OUTSTANDING INDEBTEDNESS

BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE COUNTY OF FRANKLIN, NORTH CAROLINA:

Section 1. There shall be issued pursuant to the County Finance Act and the Local Government Act bonds of the County of Franklin in the aggregate amount of One Hundred Forty Two Thousand Dollars (\$142,000.00), for the purpose of funding a like amount of valid outstanding indebtedness, evidenced by Revenue Anticipation Notes of the County of Franklin which were issued and outstanding prior to July 1, 1931, which indebtedness was incurred for maintaining the constitutional school term of said County for special purposes which are necessary expenses of said County, and for the payment of which the General Assembly of North Carolina has given its special approval for the levy of an unlimited tax.

Section 2. A tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of said bonds shall be annually levied and collected.

Section 3. Statements of the county debt incurred for school purposes and for other than school purposes have been filed with the Clerk and are open for public inspection.

Section 4. This order shall take effect upon its passage and shall not be submitted to the voters.

The foregoing order has been introduced and sworn statements have been filed under the County Finance Act showing the assessed valuation of the County to be \$10,791,672.00, and the net debt for school purposes, including that portion of the proposed bonds which is for the funding of school debt, to be \$198,000.00, and the net debt for other than school purposes, including that portion of the proposed bonds which is for the funding of debt for other than school purposes, to be \$364,000.00. A tax will be levied for the payment of the proposed bonds and interest as the same shall be issued. Any citizen or taxpayer may protest against the issuance of such bonds at a meeting of the Board of Commissioners of said County to be held at Louisburg, North Carolina, in the Courthouse at 10 o'clock, A. M., on the 19th day of December, 1934, or an adjournment thereof.
