

### Reynolds to Speak

Washington, D. C.—Prior to embarking September 2 on his nation-wide tour to speak before civic organizations on "True Americanism and Peace Time Patriotism" under the auspices of The United States Flag Association, Senator Robert R. Reynolds has announced the acceptance of invitations to deliver two addresses in the Carolinas.

His first address will take place at the annual convention of the North Carolina State Federation of Labor at Durham, N. C. August 29. The second will be before the annual convention of the Loyal Order of Moose of North Carolina and South Carolina, September 1, at Spartanburg, S. C.

While on this cross-country trip, Senator Reynolds will act in the capacity of North Carolina's Ambassador of Good Will by distributing in the visited cities thousands of pieces of literature, folders and pamphlets sent to him by Chambers of Commerce of the Tar Heel State. In addition, he will include in his talks before the civic clubs, an invitation for his hearers to come to North Carolina and view its scenic grandeur from ocean to mountains, as well as its gigantic industrial enterprises.

The itinerary for the tour mapped by Colonel James A. Moss, President General of the U. S. Flag Association of Washington, D. C., covers about 9000 miles and embraces thirty-five states.

Senator Reynolds has been invited to address principal civic organizations in the East, New England States, Southwest, the far West and the South. He intends to girdle the continent, touching at Hamilton, Can., in the North, and old Mexico in the South in a trailer attached to his automobile. He will eat and sleep aboard the trailer, thus being enabled to complete the circuit of the nation within thirty days after taking off at Washington, D. C.

The trailer is equipped with beds, kitchen and ice box, library, radio, typewriter, electric lights and lounging quarters—in short, it is a home on wheels.

Commenting today at the Capital on his scheduled trans-continental tour, Senator Reynolds said:

"My mission in fulfilling this cross-country engagement for the U. S. Flag Association at this time to speak on 'True Americanism and Peace Time Patriotism' is threefold:

"First, to personally familiarize myself with economic and social conditions prevalent in many sections of the country so that I may use the knowledge thus obtained to advantage during the next session of the National Congress.

"Second, to inform the people of the cities I visit of the wonders of our great State, its fine educational facilities and religious institutions, its historical, natural and industrial wonders, its agricultural, textile and other enterprises, its Great Smoky Mountain National Park, marvelous highways and other alluring and outstanding features.

"Third, to gather first-hand information for the publication of my new travel book to be dedicated to American Youth, entitled, 'See America in Thirty Days on \$100.00', with the hope that it will instill in the younger element of our land the desire to see America first, so that it will appreciate all the more the limitless opportunities within our own borders, and appreciate above all the superiority of our form of Government above that of any other nation on earth."

Among the interesting places to be visited are: U. S. Naval Academy at Annapolis; U. S. Military Academy at West Point; Liberty Bell and Constitution Hall at Philadelphia; New York City; Niagara Falls; Boston, with its Boston Commons, Bunker Hill and Plymouth Rock; the automobile center of Detroit; Rushmore Memorial Mountain; Deadwood, S. D., made glamorous by such characters as Calamity Jane, Deadwood Dick and Wild Bill Hickock; the Black Hills, Pike's Peak; Garden of the Gods; Yellowstone National Park; Sioux Indian Reservation; Yosemite National Park; Underground abodes in Chinatown of San Francisco; movie colony of Hollywood; Grand Canyon and petrified forests of Arizona; Carlsbad Caverns of New Mexico; the Alamo at San Antonio, and oil fields and ranches of Texas; the quaint old French city of New Orleans; St. Augustine, Fla. (oldest Spanish City of America); Stone Mountain of Georgia; Norris Dam; Cherokee Indian Reservation and the Great Smoky Mountain National Park of North Carolina; Mt. Mitchell, highest peak east of the Rockies; Revolutionary battlefield of Kings Mountain; Charlotte, N. C., where was signed the first Declaration of Independence; and, the return to the Capital at Washington through the picturesque and historic Shenandoah Valley of Virginia, on to the Natural Bridge, Crystal Caves, and the homes and shrines of three presidents of the United States, Jefferson, Madison and Monroe.

E. C. Blair, extension agronomist at State College, reports a great deal of interest in the farmers' tour he is conducting in various counties. In each of the counties the farmers study farming practices of their neighbors.

### Timely Farm Questions

Answered at State College

QUESTION: How can I renew my old, run-down pasture?

ANSWER: All weeds and shrubbery should be cut out and the soil scratched to a depth of 2 or 3 inches. This may be done with a heavy spike-tooth harrow or with a disc set almost straight so as not to destroy the old sod. Fertilizer and seed are then sown. However, if the pasture is badly infested with obnoxious weeds it is advisable to break the land and grow some crop before reseeding for pasture. Recommendations for fertilizer and seed mixtures for various soils are contained in Extension Circular No. 202 and copies may be obtained free upon application to Agricultural Editor, State College.

QUESTION: Will burning off woods increase the flow of water in springs?

ANSWER: No. On the contrary this practice will decrease the spring flow. Percolation of water in the ground is a slow process and the more woods mold a forest accumulates the more water it can absorb and feed into the springs. Any fire destroys materials for making this woods mold and thereby lessens spring flow.

QUESTION: Should cows be milked before freshening?

ANSWER: In the majority of cases no milk should be taken before the animal freshens. However, there are some cases where this is necessary. When the udder becomes inflamed or where the animal shows signs of heavy milk production and seems to be in pain it is well to remove a small amount of milk so as to relieve this condition. Calves need this colostrum or first milk and, where possible, it should not be removed unless there is another cow freshening at the same time from which the calf may secure this first milk.

## The Story of the Constitution

### VII—THE SUPREME COURT AND ITS POWER

The need for a Federal Judiciary was apparent to all the delegates to the Convention of 1787. The earlier attempts at an effective Federation had been handicapped by the lack of any court having jurisdiction outside its own State. The scheme of "checks and balances" which the framers of the Constitution set up called for a judicial branch independent of and coequal with the Legislative and Executive.

The number of Justices of the Supreme Court is not fixed by the Constitution. Originally there were seven. The number was increased to nine in the administration of President Grant. The Constitution does, however, provide that all Federal judges shall be appointed by the President, and shall hold office "during good behavior." The number of inferior Federal Courts is left to Congress to decide.

The power of the Federal Judiciary, in the language of the Constitution, extends "to all cases, in law and equity, arising under this Constitution, the laws of the United States, and treaties," as well as to cases arising from disputes between States, or citizens of different States, and those affecting foreign interests.

The great power of the Supreme Court derives from its duty of interpreting the Constitution. That it might exercise that power to declare an act of Congress unconstitutional was foreseen, and accepted as a matter of course, by the framers of the Constitution. The Federal Judiciary system was intended as a check upon the Legislative and Executive branches of the Government, to see that neither of them exceeded the powers specifically granted to them by the people in the Constitution.

It has been largely through this power of interpretation by the Supreme Court that the power of the Federal Government has grown from its early beginnings.
