**"Storm Over The Andes"**

Some of the most remarkable flying ever done in a motion picture is to be seen in Universal's thrilling South American war and aviation drama, "Storm Over the Andes," at the Louisburg Theatre, Wednesday, Nov. 27th, according to those who have seen previews. More than a dozen of Hollywood's most skilled flyers, some of them Army graduates, helped Jack Holt, star of the production, Antonio Moreno, Gene Lockhart, Mona Barrie, Grant Withers and other players to inject realism into the production. Among the veterans of the skyways who participated in the production are Garland Lincoln and Frank Tomick, both former Army fliers with some 6,500 hours of flying to their credit; Earl Gordon, and Herb White, who have been identified with Hollywood pilots' associations for many years, and Vance Breece, former airplane manufacturer and airline operator.

Most war aviation pictures have been made with the Western Front as atmosphere, but in this case the battling is done in South America, over desolate wastes where a crack-up means death from wild animals or reptiles if the pilot is not injured by his fall or uses his parachute."
