Birds Suffering From Cold Spell

The cold rain of January 2 on top of the eight inch snow of last week has placed the wildlife of this county in a precarious position. Game and song birds are suffering from lack of food, and the cold, wet weather is very conducive to the spread of disease.
 The wildlife department of the Soil Conservation Service is making a plea to the sportsman to lay aside his gun for the remainder of the season. Hunting coupled with severe weather will deal the birds a blow from which it may take several years to recover.
 A more sportsman-like thing to do in this critical period is to feed the birds. Everyone can help by scattering a few crumbs, meat scraps, grain and other seed for them to eat. Dozens of songbirds can be attracted to one's backyard by erection of feeding stations. Every interested sportsman should cooperate with the farmers in seeing that corn, wheat, oats, sorghum seed, rye, and other grains are distributed in all likely quail ranges.
 The Soil Conservation Service is developing a program which will eventually take care of the birds in a time like this. Shrubs which are a source of winter food are being used in erosion control plantings as food and protection coverts.

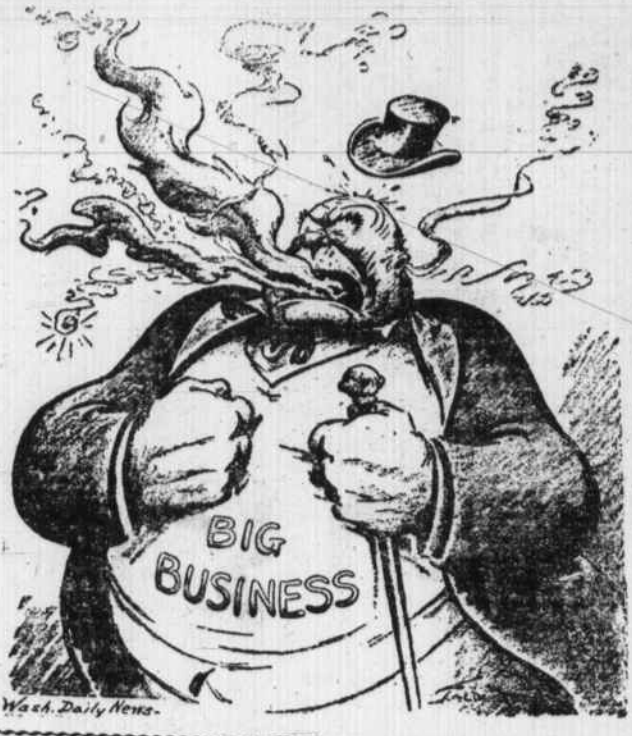

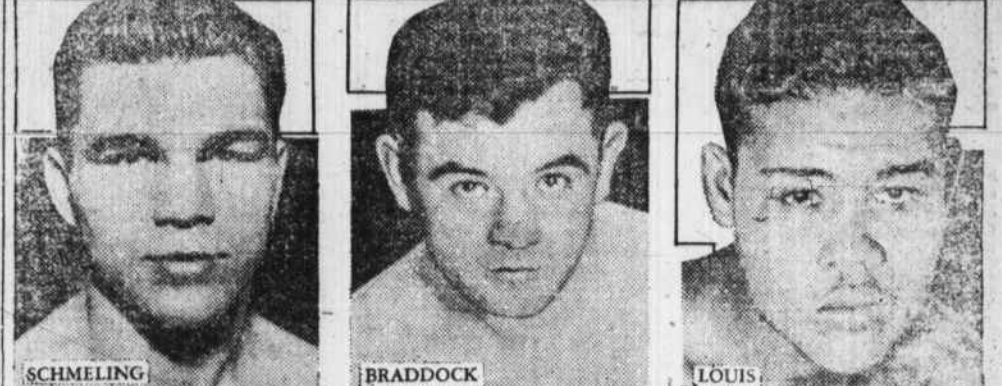
