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CLYDER. HOEY IS NOMINATED GOVERNOR

Wilkins P. Horton Nominated For Lieut.-Governor---Thad Eure For Secretary of State

Hoey Increases Majority From 3,468 to 53,934-In Other Two Offices Low Man in First Primary Wins Second Primary July 4th, Upsets Many Precedents

Complete unofficial returns, as compiled by the Associated Press Tuesday night, showed the majority of Clyde R. Hoey over Dr. McDonald to be 53,934 on the basis of a vote of 266,-813 for Hoey and 212,879 for

Raleigh July 5.—Clyde R. Hoey was nominated for Governor by a very wide majority in yesterday's run-off Democratic primary. Incomplete returns indicate that the 58-year-old Shelby attorney, who—is a brother-in-law of former Governor O. Max Gardner and who was a defender and beneficiary of the present Ehringhaus administration, did more than greatly multiply the slender majority of 3,468 votes by which he led Dr. Ralph W. McDonald, Winston-Salem professor, antisales tax candidate and administration foe, in the first primary on June 6.

It appears on the face of incomplete returns that the force of the Hoey victory which kent

complete returns that the force of the Hoey victory, which kept unbroken the tradition by which the leading candidate for Governor in the first Democratic primary has always been nominated, was sufficient to shatter that same tradition for both of the two lesser offices contested yes-

Win Other Offices

It apppears that the Hoey forces, who definitely championed the causes of the candidates who ran second in the previous pri-mary, succeeded in nominating their men for Lieutenant Gover-

nor and Secretary of State.

Thad A Eure, principal clerk of the House of Representatives, appears to have definitely overcome a 43,000 vote lead held by Secretary of State Stacey W. Wade, who falled of nomination the first primary over both of in the first primary over both of his opponents by only 13,000

By a smaller margin, State Senator Wilkins P. Horton, of Chat-ham County, like Hoey, a sales tax advocate, appears to have tax advocate, appears to overcome the 23,000 vote tax advocate, appears to have overcome the 23,000 vote lead held in the first primary by State Senator Paul D. Grady, of Johnston County, president pro tempore of the 1935 Senate, a sales tax foe.

Baxter Durham, who had served as State Auditor for 16 served as State Auditor for 16 years, was defeated in the first primary by George Ross Pou. At the same time, W.
