

WHAT'S WHAT ABOUT SOCIAL SECURITY

In making reports Question: under the Social Security Act do I have to give my employee's account number and his name as it is written on his account number

ANSWER: Yes, you should give your employee's social security account number on those reports calling for that information and you also should give his name as it is on his account card. For example: if the employee's name were Richard Roe, but he had ob-tained his account card under the name of Dick Roe, you would use Dick Roe in making your reports.
