Timely Farm Questions

Answered at State College

QUESTION: How can I build an inexpensive water system for my farm?

ANSWER: This, of course, depends upon the present water supply, the kind of system desired, and the money that can be spent on the system. If there is a spring located higher than the point of delivery, then the water can be piped into the home at little cost. If the water must be pumped then the cost will be greater. A simple and inexpensive system is explained and illustrated in Extension Folder No. 38, issued by the

Agricultural Extension Service at State College and this may be had free upon application to the Agricultural Editor.

QUESTION: Please tell me what to do for White Diarrhea in my poultry flock?

ANSWER: This trouble is often confused with the simple diarrhea caused by overheating, chilling, crowding, and faulty diet as well as inadequate ventilation and direct drafts. It is well to check all of the above causes and correct them. The true "white diarrhea" is a germ borne disease and is brought about by hatching eggs from diseased adults. In this disease large numbers of the birds usually die in a very short time with the most severe outbreak occurring during the first ten days of the chicks' life. Rigid sanitation should be practiced and all advanced cases destroyed. Specimens should be sent to the Poultry Disease Laboratory at State College for an autopsy and directions for handling the trouble will be issued on the basis of these findings.

QUESTION: What is the best fertilizer for general use in the garden?

ANSWER: A very satisfactory general purpose fertilizer for the home garden is a mixture containing 5 per cent nitrogen, 7 per cent phosphoric acid, and 5 per cent potash. Leafy crops, such as cabbage, lettuce, and kale will require more nitrogen, but that can be supplied in the form of side applications of readily available nitrogen fertilizers. If stable manure is used, a formula high in superphosphate is desirable on many soils. Fertilizer and lime recommendations for the various vegetables are given in Extension Circular No. 199 and copies of this may be secured by writing the Agricultural Editor at State College.
