Possibly the most interesting piece of political news comes from Cedar Rock and states that Taylor W. ENFORCE TRAFFIC LAWS

New York City started a year ago to reform this practice. The imposition of fines for traffic violations was made compulsory on magistrates, who could no longer suspend sentences. One result has been to cut down the number of traffic accidents. Another has been to increase the city's revenues by nearly \$750,000 a year, making the magistrates' court practically self-sustaining.

There is too much laxity in law-enforcement of all kinds in this country. There should be no leniency for wilful violators of the laws for safe driving.
