### NOTICE OF SPECIAL BOND ELECTION—TOWN OF YOUNGVILLE, NORTH CAROLINA \$15,000.00 WATER BONDS \$12,000.00 SEWER BONDS

Special election will be held between the hour of 7 A. M. and Sunset on the 30th day of September, 1938, at which time there shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the Town of Youngville the following question: Shall an Ordinance passed on the first day of August, 1938 authorizing issuing \$12,000.00 for Sewer Bonds and \$15,000.00 for Water Bonds of the Town of Youngville, and a tax to retire said Bonds be approved?

Said Ordinance authorizes the issuance of Bonds not exceeding \$12,000.00 Sewer Bonds for the purpose of constructing a sewer plant and \$15,000.00 for the purpose of constructing a water plant and system in the Town of Youngville.

If said Bonds are issued a tax will be levied for the payment of the principal and interest thereon on all taxable property in the Town of Youngville. That for said election the regular registration books for elections in the Town of Youngville shall be used, and such books shall be open for the registration of voters, not theretofore registered, on the 3rd day of September, 1938, and closed at Sunset on the 17th day of September, 1938, except Sundays and legal holidays.

On each Saturday during said period, said books shall remain open at the polling place. The polling place and name of the election officers, subject to change as provided by law, are as follows:

Polling Place: Youngville Mayor's Office on corner of West Railroad and Main Streets. Registrar: C. C. Winston. Judges of Election: E. M. Mitchell and C. E. Jeffreys.

### ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING \$12,000.00 SEWER BONDS AND \$15,000.00 WATER IMPROVEMENT BONDS

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Youngville:

SECT. 1: That the Town of Youngville issue its Bonds pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act, as amended, in an amount not exceeding \$12,000.00 for sewer plant construction and \$15,000.00 for water system construction.

SECT. 2: That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of said Bonds shall be annually levied and collected.

SECT. 3: That a statement of the debt of the Town has been filed with the Clerk and is open to public inspection.

SECT. 4: That this Ordinance shall take effect when approved by the voters of the Town of Youngville at an election, as provided by law.

That the foregoing Ordinance was passed on the first day of August, 1938, and was first posted and published on the 28th day of August, 1938.

Any action or proceedings questioning the validity of said Ordinance must be commenced within thirty (30) days after the date of its first posting and publication.
