## Prices Are Firm On Middle Belt

Averages Range From About 20 To 23 Cents; Turnover Continues Heavy

Firm to slightly higher prices were reported yesterday for second day's sales on some North Carolina Middle Belt tobacco markets. The volume of sales continued heavy.

The State and Federal departments of agriculture reported that low to fine primings and good and fine lugs constituted the major part of offerings. Primings predominated. Common to fair leaf was offered in increased quantities, the report said, and the volume of cutters remained small.

Farmers throughout the belt were generally pleased with the way sales are going and rejections ranged from about 20 to slightly more than 23 cents a pound.

The agriculture department's report on prices by U. S. grades (prices continued to range at which the bulk of tobacco of stated qualities sold):

Leaf—Fair quality, \$19 to \$25; low, 12.50 to 18.50; common, 8 to 14.

Lugs—Choice, 29 to 32; fine, 28 to 31; good, 21.50 to 28; fair, 15 to 23.

Primings—Choice, 29 to 31; fine 26 to 29; good, 23 to 28; fair, 15 to 24, low, 10 to 15.

## FARM PRICES DOWN

Prices of farm products in local markets on August 15 were 3 points lower than a month earlier and again at the level prevailing in May and June, the U. S. Bureau of Agricultural Economics has reported.

Farm tours arranged by the Extension Service have been largely attended in most counties and are expected to show good results.
