Rose Bowl, Pasadena, Jan. 2.—The Blue Devils of Duke University lost a football game out here this afternoon—but don't let that worry you.

The boys from Durham went down in the scoring figures, 7-3, but that was the only department in which they failed to prove themselves champions.

Undefeated, untied, unscored on, and unfaunted, the Devils went into battle against Southern California as the underdogs. They weren't given a chance by the Pacific Coast experts.

The boys from Duke demonstrated early that their punting game and defensive strength had not been exaggerated. Then they forged into the lead—on a field goal by Tony Ruffa, substitute tackle—after a minute of play in the fourth quarter.

That field goal—kicked from the 23-yard line—threw the 92,000 fans in the Rose Bowl into pandemonium and made the many thousands of Tar Heels very, very happy.

Those three points were enough for victory—UNTIL a Southern California substitute back named Doyle Nave swung into action in closing minutes.

Just in Time

And in the very last minute—with 40 seconds to go, to be exact—Nave threw the pass which produced the only score made against Duke in a campaign begun last September and concluded today.

The receiver of the scoring pass was Alvin Krueger, tall end who gained undying fame at Southern California by taking a pass for touchdown in a recent game with Notre Dame. There's no telling what they will do for Krueger now—perhaps the Trojans will erect a monument in his honor.

Southern California's touchdown pass came on a play started at Duke's 18-yard line. It climaxed a 61-yard advance, covered in 11 plays.

The Trojans had marched from their 39-yard line to a first-down at Duke's 16. Nave, clicking with passes, was crowded on the next play and thrown for a loss of two yards. Then came the explosion which blew Duke to defeat.

DUKE SUPPORTERS DESIRE ARREST OF NAVE AND KRUEGER

Pasadena Police Chief Gets Telegram From Vigilantes Charging Larceny

Pasadena, Calif., Jan. 3.—Chief of Police Charles W. Kelley received a telegraphic warrant today from Durham, N. C., home of Duke University, signed the "Duke Vigilantes," for the arrest and incarceration of Doyle Nave and Al Krueger, Southern California passing combination that won yesterday's Rose Bowl football game.

"Hold Nave and Krueger of Southern California football team, both charged with grand larceny, viz: Stealing game from Duke University. Truly, two great opportunists. (Signed) DUKE VIGILANTES."

Chief Kelley sent this telegram in return:

"Your order has been duly obeyed. Krueger and Nave in dungeon guarded by squad with machine guns. New Year's greetings to supporters of most gentlemanly and scientific football team ever to appear in Rose Bowl."
