H. and Sallie Baker Furgerson, prominent in the social and religious life of Louisburg fifty years ago. Her father a man of artistic temperament was skillful in the use of the pencil and the brush, a talent that survived in this gifted daughter, blessed in her individual possessions of heaven, bestowed facilities and charm. She was still further blessed in her happy marriage to the late L. P. Hicks an outstanding citizen of Franklin County, who in 1933 preceded her into the glory world. For nearly fifty years under the continued blessing of heaven these two traveled together and worked together—as one. In this town where they always stood for what was right and against all they thought wrong or questionable. In yonder Methodist Church which they regularly attended and always liberally supported—and where a beautiful memorial window—their gift—bears the names of her departed parents. And in their home too, they worked so beautifully and so successfully together—a home whose very atmosphere breathed refinement, culture, hospitality and religion—the very best things that life has to offer. How many of the Master's tired servants found rest and refreshment beneath that expansive roof during all these years. He only knows. Yes, the elements were so mixed in her that nature might stand up and say to all the world: This was a woman—a real woman; a Christian woman.

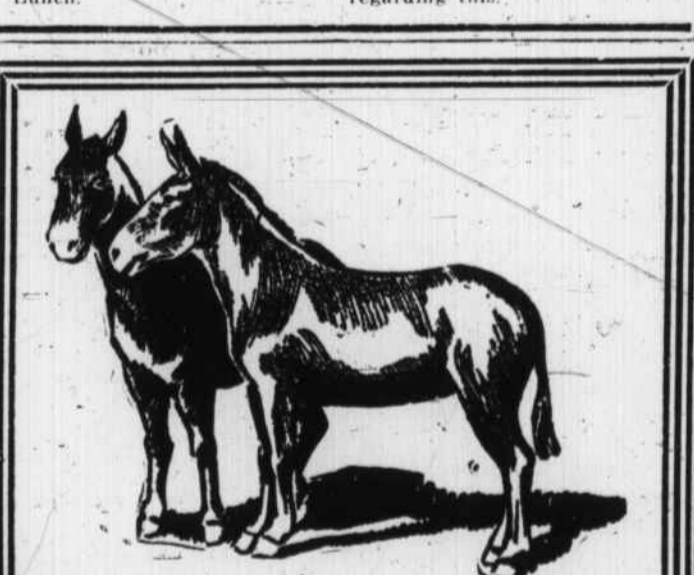
