Timely Farm Questions

Answered at State College

QUESTION: How long after a legume is grown is the soil good for inoculating purposes?

ANSWER: Not more than three years should have elapsed since the legume was produced and prior to this it should have been grown for at least two years on the field. In collecting the soil, remove the top inch or two and then take the remaining soil to a depth of not more than eight inches. If the sun is bright, the sacked soil should be well covered until it can be put in a cool, shady place. From one to three bushels of soil should be collected for each acre to be inoculated.

QUESTION: When should eggs be candled after they are placed in the incubator?

ANSWER: The eggs should be candled on the seventh day and all dead germs and infertiles removed. This should be done in a dark room or at night to prevent further spoilage. A fertile egg will appear to contain a spider—the germ representing the body of the spider while the blood vessels represent the spider legs. An infertile egg will be clear with the yolk slightly visible.

QUESTION: What fertilizer is best for early sweet potatoes?

ANSWER: When potatoes are grown for the early market on sandy soils, a mixture of 3 percent nitrogen, 8 percent phosphoric acid, and 8 percent potash applied at the rate of 1,000 to 1,200 pounds an acre is recommended. Where more than this amount is used, one-half should be applied before planting and one-half soon after the plants are well rooted. For the late harvest of Porto Rico and Nancy Hall sweets when grown on sandy loam soils in the Coastal Plain section, an application of 600 to 800 pounds of a 3-8-8 mixture is recommended.

HEAVY

Continuous heavy production of eggs during January and heavy culling of flocks, leaving numbers of layers on February 1 about 5 percent in excess of last year, are shown in the February report of sample farm flocks.
